NOT more than one-third of the cholera patients in the Russian hospitals die. It is thought it can be pretty well controlled by the time it reaches America.

A FRENCH Photographer has made arrangements to descend to the bottom of the sea in a sub marine vessel, and take photographs of sub-marine objects. He proposes to use electric light.

FANNY JACKSON, a young colored woman of Washington, District of Columbia, graduated at Oberlin, in the classical school. She is the first female graduate from that institution of pure African blood.

A CALIFORNIA editor, Mr. Tabb Mitchell, was robbed lately in Placerville of \$50. The press of that State is discussing, at some length, whether he came honestly in possession of it or not.

EDWARD E. KELLY, for some years post-master at Walla Walla, died at Santa Clara, California, on the 29th of October, aged twenty-nine years. Mr. Kelly was a man universally liked, and gave great promise of future usefulness.

THE superintendent of the shore line of railroad from New Haven to New York, took away the patronage of the company from the New Haven Palladium, because that journal reported the circumstances of a railroad slaughter in full, which occurred on that road.

MISS Doctress Mary E. Walker has asked for an appointment of Surgeon in the regular army. She served as a volunteer surgeon, but Stanton will not hear of such an innovation as a female surgeon in the army.

IT is said that there are forty thousand children in New York City, who never attend school. There appears to be an excellent chance in that place for the investment of some portion of that surplus philanthropy which appears to be exercised only in behalf of the freedmen of the South.

THE MINNESOTA LODE.—The Minnesota lode at Owyhee is a well-defined vein, three feet in width at fifty feet depth. An assay of the rock gave, silver, \$668; gold, \$345—total, \$1013. The lode is the property of the New York and Oregon Gold and Silver Mining Company, of which Mr. G. Collier Robbins is agent and general superintendent.

JOHN McCALL, of Mendocino county, California, has brought suit against Gen. McDowell to recover, as he alleges, damages to the amount of \$100,000, for false imprisonment. It appears that he gave three cheers for the murder of Lincoln. He ought to be glad that he did not suffer even more serious damages than he claims in his complaint.

ALMANAC FOR SAN FRANCISCO.—It has been suggested that a new almanac, calculated for the vicinity of San Francisco, would be very useful. In the place of the usual weather prophecies, a wag says such prognostications might be used as would indicate the earthquake probabilities. For instance: "Expect light, moderate earthquakes about this time," "Balmy earthquakes with showers of plastering and brick-bats," "Look out for a heavy fall of parapet-walls and church-steeplesthroughout this month," and the like.

THERE is a grape vine in Santa Barbara county, California, of which the following particulars are given: The trunk has a circumference of 3 feet and 9 inches, at a distance of 4 feet above the surface of the ground. The branches are supported on an arbor 114 feet long, 78 feet wide, and 96 yards in circumference. It now has 5,000 bunches of grapes, estimated to average two pounds weight to a bunch. It was planted in 1826, by Dona Marguerita Dominguez. The ground about it is apparently never cultivated, but water is occasionally poured in a basin around the roots.

### HOW TO DO IT.

With the assistance of the veteran regular troops which have arrived, or will arrive, in this department, the volunteer forces now in the field, would, during the coming winter, pretty well exterminate the Snake Indians now at war with the whites in south-eastern Oregon, and the south-western districts of Idaho. It is only a measure of common justice that the savages should be put down in some way or another. The General Government owes it to our citizens to do that much, and as a people, we shall not be satisfied if any less is done. It cannot be possible that the War Department is ignorant that the murder of citizens of this State and adjoining territories is a daily occurrence, and we can only attribute the folly of withdrawing a portion of the troops now in the field, as resulting from some sinister influence or representation from some source at present unknown to the public. To counteract this, the Governor of this State should at once notify the War Department of the state of affairs in the district east of the Cascades. It is not too late to prevent the disbandment of some of the volunteer forces now in service, if the War Department can be made to understand the importance of it. Taking these forces, and arming the Warm-Spring bands of Indians, a winter campaign may yet be made a perfect success.

It is an easy task to get into the Harney Lake country by the Crooked River passes, and a force thrown in there during the winter, will be able to take the Snakes at such a disadvantage that a defeat would be equivalent to destruction. If the assistance of one or two companies of citizens should be required, they can easily be raised in this county or at Canyon City. Thus, at comparatively little expense, an end may be put to a war which otherwise may be prolonged at an extravagant cost to the National treasury. Some such scheme as this, elaborated by the military authorities, should be put in execution. Co-operative parties of citizens from Boise, Owyhee and Powder river, might be raised, and thus the Indians would be effectually surrounded. There are hundreds among the miners who would gladly participate in such an enterprise, from the double motive of a fondness for adventure and a desire to see the country.

If the matter is not taken in hand now another season will elapse before anything of practical value can be done. The interests of the State require the development of the resources of the eastern section, and without the subjugation or extermination of the Snakes, this cannot be done.

MORE INDIAN OUTRAGES.—We have news by the arrival of the Canyon City stage, of additional Indian outrages on the Canyon City road. On the 2d inst., three California cattle-drovers were attacked, while gathering up their cattle, at a point between the John Day bridge and Cottonwood Creek, and all of them severely wounded. One was shot off his horse, and only saved his life by taking refuge in the brush. The other two came into the station at Cottonwood and gave the alarm, and the wounded man was brought in. The Indians drove off twelve or fourteen head of their cattle. There are only ten or twelve men at Camp Watson, and the Indians frequently show themselves near the post, in numbers too great to be defeated. Most of the men at the Camp are off on escort duty, and Captain Small cannot make any move to chastise the savages, without risking the Camp and the stores gathered there. When the stage reached Currant Creek, on the road down, they found some teams there, and learned that four horses had been stolen from them, a few hours before. Coming up to the summit of the hill, on this side of the creek, a party of five Indians were seen, having about twenty horses, most of which were work horses. The Indians attempted to cross the road ahead of the stage, but seeing they were likely to be intercepted, drove the horses off in another direction. It is supposed that the horses on Currant Creek were among those seen with the Indians, and there must have been other camps robbed, from which we have not yet heard.

No attention will be paid to applications for pardon from rebels residing abroad. They must return home and throw themselves on the mercy of the country.

NEW QUARTZ MILL.—During the past ten days, says the Owyhee Avalanche of the 28th ult., eighteen teams have reached Sinker Creek, all laden with machinery and stores for Mr. Grenzeback's new quartz mill. Three more are on the way with the remainder. The main building is up and will be shingled the coming week. When finished it will cover a space forty-five by sixty feet. At present only ten stamps will be put in it, but the mill is of twenty stamp capacity. The Frieberg process, with ovens and Varney pans will be used.
