## Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

### California News.

**San Francisco, November 6.**—The schooner *Milton Badger*, Captain Harding, arrived yesterday afternoon, twelve days from Anadyr Bay, bringing nearly a month's later intelligence from the Russian Telegraph expedition. The *Milton Badger* took up the exploring party commanded by Capt. C. S. McKay, and consisting of Capt. Alexander Arnold, Alexander Harder, W. W. Robinson and Grafon Smith. The last news brought by the *Palmetto*, which arrived here on the 22d ult., stated that the *Milton Badger* set sail from Sitka to Anadyr Bay, on the 21st of August. She landed her party safely in the Bay, when she left them, with a full outfit and prepared to pursue the explorations of the Anadyr River, and thence across Ochotsk sea during the coming winter. They will use reindeer for the purpose, which are found to be plenty in the vicinity. A letter from Col. Bulkley, dated Anadyr Bay, Oct. 9th, says all favorable, and land parties of both continents on shore with supplies. The *Golden Gate*, with Col. Hyde's party, which was last reported to have parted from the *Geo. S. Wright* in a storm while being towed from Sitka to Fort St. Michael, arrived safely in Plover Bay on the 26th of September. The country in Siberia is reported destitute of timber and very favorably adapted for the exploration proposed by the company.

Thomas F. Hays, a young man 21 years of age, was shot in the breast and instantly killed by Michael Hynes, on Pollard Place, yesterday. The two parties lived in the same house and had frequently quarreled. Yesterday they met in the hall, where the quarrel was renewed, and Hays was beaten and knocked down stairs. He then went to his room and got a single barreled pistol, with which he returned, when he met Hynes armed with a six shooter. Hays snapped his pistol at Hynes, but missed fire. Hynes then fired two shots, killing Hays instantly.

A meeting of the Union League was held on Friday evening last, when it was concluded to discontinue their regular meetings, the necessity for vigilance no longer existing.

**PROBABLE ABATEMENT OF THE MORMON NUISANCE.**—No thinking and conscientious man will deny to any people the right to worship God according to the dictates of their own consciences; but when the practice of beastly sensualism is made a part of religious institutions, it should be checked—by reason and by law, if possible—by force, if necessary. It has ever been a social ordinance of the Germanic races, and those which inhabit the British Isles, from whom we, as a people, are principally derived, that every man should have one woman as a wife, and no more. The moral, mental and physical superiority of our race are clearly traceable to this practice. But in the face of immemorial traditions and practice, a school of religionists has sprung up in our country, and is endeavoring to graft the institution of polyamy on our domestic code. The subject has been treated with reason and persuasion for the last thirty years, but since these means have only encouraged the insolence of the Mormon leaders, they may look, in the next ten years, for some very rough measures being used to stop them in their licentious courses. The influx of immigrants from the older States to Utah, will of necessity, build up a party opposed to polyamy, and this new element of opposition will be continually supported by the presence of a military force, until it gets control of the politics of the territory. This event will be hastened by the apostasy of many members of the Mormon Church, who will only be too glad to find protection in their withdrawal from association with the other "twin relic." To make polyamy, either open or disguised, a penitentiary offense, will be the next step, and a few convictions will convince even the most fanatical that the institution is wrong. It is not at all improbable that the imitators of the great Brigham Young, himself, will have a chance in a few years to repent of their crimes in the cool, sequestered retreats of a prison, and have their polygamous aspirations reduced by the restraining influences of low diet.

In the Criminal Court at St. Louis, recently, a lawyer defending a negro charged with grand larceny, claimed that under the Constitution he was entitled to be tried by a jury of negroes. The Court overruled the application.

**A WHISKY REBELLION.**—On the 30th of October the people of Scio, at the forks of the Santiam, proceeded to a drinking house, located in that place, and under pressure of threats to destroy the stock of liquors in it, anyhow, induced the proprietor to accept the value of it. The barrels containing it were then taken into the street, and emptied. A merchant, being inspired by the example, destroyed a barrel of whisky, being all he had on hand, and when evening's shades fell on Scio, there was not enough ardent spirits in the place to dampen the throat of a sparrow.
