**NORTH BOISE QUARTZ.**—Among the many quartz mining districts which contain good paying lodes, that of Banner City, on Smith's Fork of North Boise, is among the richest and most extensive. In August, 1864, the Banner Lode was found, running along the top of a ridge, between two gulches emptying into the North Boise, and during that Summer many hundreds of prospectors from Idaho City, distant about thirty miles, visited the neighborhood. The consequence was the discovery of many silver-bearing lodes, carrying the precious metal with wonderful uniformity, and in quantities to suit the most avaricious. There seems to be one great central lode in this district, running from southwest to northeast. This is called the Black Warrior Lode. Some hundreds of feet to the west of it is the Banner Lode, which dips to the east, or towards the great vein. The same is true of all other veins on the west side of the Black Warrior, among which are the Delaware, Wolverine and Lincoln lodes. On the east side of the central lode, are the Washington, of doubtful continuity, and the Washoe, which is known to be rich, and believed to be extensive. Ahead on the range of these lodes is the Abe-and-Andy Lode, of great prospective value, and many others. All that these lodes require is the application of skill and money. Already a large amount of work and money has been expended upon some of them, and their value established at high figures. It is doubtful if the Banner could be bought at this time for \$50 a foot, and that amount was paid for it before a shaft was down twenty feet on the lode. The lodes vary in width from two feet to thirty—the greater being the thickness of the Black Warrior. These veins run out on the narrow divide between the North Boise and the South Payette, and the rapid descent to the latter stream affords a fine opportunity to find the lodes at a great depth. As an earnest of the intention of some of the owners in the Banner Lode, they have now on the road down over a ton of the rock, which is to be sent to New York for exhibition. The rock will tell its own tale.

**THE NEW RAILROAD AT THE CASCADES.**—The last term of the District Court, for Clarke County, W. T., closed on the 29th of October. During the session, the case of D. F. Bradford and others against the Middle Cascade Portage Company, came up for hearing. It seems that certain parties are engaged in building a railroad from the Middle Block House to the head of the Cascades, and their line crosses certain property belonging to Mr. Bradford and others. Having a charter from the Washington Territory Legislature, with the usual power to take and appraise lands and assess damages, the Middle Cascade Portage Company procured the appointment of appraisers from the District Court, and proceeded to assess the sum to be paid. This was fixed at \$1,000, and Mr. D. F. Bradford and associates appealed to the District Court. In court they refused to join issue on the facts, and plead irregularity of the award of the appraisers, and the invalidity of the defendants' charter. The Court sustained the appraisers and the validity of the charter. The case goes to the Supreme Court of Washington Territory. The case has some local interest to the inhabitants of this place.

**THE TROOK & JENNINGS LODE.**—A shaft of fifty feet depth on the Trook & Jennings Lode, Owyhee, reveals some very encouraging facts to owners in this noted vein. Across a "cab-rock" of four feet several extremely rich seams of quartz occur, and the west side shows a true wall-rock. These seams amount, in the aggregate, to twenty inches, and are convergent and increasing in size. It is presumed that at one hundred feet the vein will be solid and twenty-four inches in width. Galleries have been driven each way from the shaft, about twenty-five feet, at fifty feet depth.

**SUBSCRIPTION FOR A FLAG.**—It is proposed to raise funds to purchase a flag for Jackson Engine Company. A committee composed of members of the company has been appointed and empowered to receive subscriptions for that purpose. The years of faithful and unrequited services of the company commend it to the grateful consideration of the citizens of the Dalles.

**THE DEATH OF YANCEY.**—The Nashville Banner says that Wm. L. Yancey died from the effects of injuries received in a personal collision with Hill, a Senator from Georgia, on the floor of the Confederate Senate. Yancey attacked Hill, and was thrown by the latter with great violence against a desk, and his spine was so affected that he died in consequence of it. Yancey, like Stonewall Jackson, was zealous Presbyterian, and had a marvellous eloquence in prayer. He was a man that only needed to have seen the right way to have been truly a great man. His genius was prostituted to the defense of the heathenish abomination of the peculiar institution, and his reward is in accordance with his errors. If he had brought the same earnestness, eloquence and passion to the support of the Union that he did to secession, his name would have been placed among the few immortals. In consideration of the scandal attached to the method of Mr. Yancey's death, the Confederate Congress passed resolutions of secrecy, and the circumstances of the affair have only lately come to a knowledge of the public. He was buried at Montgomery, Alabama.
