## Epitome of Telegraphic News.

### Atlantic News.

**New York, Oct. 28.**—E. B. Ketchum was arraigned in the Court of General Sessions, before Recorder Hoffman to-day. He withdrew his plea of not guilty on the indictment for forgery in the third degree, and put in a plea of guilty. It was agreed that his sentence be suspended until he could be examined in the civil cases now before the courts.

**New York, Oct. 31.**—The steamer *Massachusetts* which has just arrived at Philadelphia from Key West, reports a tremendous gale on October 22d. Every vessel except the *Massachusetts* went ashore in the harbor.

A number of the members of the Fenian Senate continued their session to-day. The proceedings were secret, but it was reported that agents were to be sent to Ireland at once to organize for the great revolution, which it is believed will take a practicable shape in a short time. It is also said that the Fenians have received the indorsement of officials in this country, whose names will lend not only strength to the movement, but will be the guarantee of its success.

It is reported that Hampton Roads will soon be the rendezvous of a large and important fleet of our naval vessels. The steamers *Vanderbilt* and *Monitor*, which arrived here on Saturday, are the pioneers of the maritime gathering at this point. It is said the vessels are to be de-patched to squadrons in different parts of the world.

**Washington, Oct. 31.**—The *Post's* Washington special dispatch says: The President today received advices that the Georgia State Convention had declared slavery abolished, by a unanimous vote and without debate.

**Washington, Nov. 2.**—The *Post* has received a telegram from Herschel V. Johnson, dated Milledgeville, Ga., Oct. 32d, saying: All is going well. The Convention passed an ordinance repealing the ordinance of secession, and all ordinances and resolutions subversive of or antagonistic to the civil and military authorities of the United States, adopted by the people of Georgia in Convention, between the 16th of January and 24th of March, 1861.

### Foreign News.

**New York, Oct. 28.**—Files by the steamer *Africa* have been received.

In regard to the Adams and Russel correspondence, the *London News* says: "It should not be forgotten that the claims made by Spain against the American Government, under similar circumstances, were only by treaty, while those made by Portugal furnished material for argument for over thirty years. If powers such as Spain and Portugal, under such circumstances, felt themselves bound to keep up the discussion until they obtained some sort of a settlement, it is not probable that the United States will follow a different course. Assuredly Lord Russel's refusal to refer the matters now in dispute will not settle them."

Wilmer & Smith's *European Times* says: "It is just possible to avoid the payment of \$2,500,000 in money, but we may lose by putting our opposition on a principle so unmistakable as to cause us, when the cases are reversed, and when the Americans are the neutrals and we the belligerents, to suffer terribly in person and pocket. We don't apprehend war, for war in these days could not arise out of this business, but something nearly as bad may arise in future, when the practice we have defended may be returned against us in ways that are eidous to surmise."

**MORE INDIAN OUTRAGES.**—By the arrival of the Canyon City stage, we are informed that the depredations of the Indians on the Canyon City road are matters of daily occurrence. Horses have been stolen, since our last information, at Alkali Flat, about one hundred miles from the Dalles, and at various points on the road. A Portuguese was shot at from the road-side, twelve miles this side of Camp Watson, and slightly wounded in the hand. One of the California cattle-drovers, who was wounded some days since, is in a very precarious condition. Considerable interest is manifested on the road in regard to the subjugation of these Indians, and there is much talk of citizens fitting out to take the matter in hand, and inflict chastisement on the marauders.
