THE EFFECT OF CUSTOM .- Not many years since there came to Utah a Gentile, by the name of Cornwall, who after arriving here married a second wife, a widow, by the name of Graham, a resident of the settlement of Stringtown, on the southern side of the Ogden, where he also located himself, and followed the occupa-

tion of farming.

Some difficulty concerning a water ditch occurred between him and a neighbor, a sheriff and supposed Danite, which resulted in a threat to take his life. He efterward became slightly involved in debt, and, as is generally supposed by his neighbors, started in company with another man on a peddling tour to raise means to liquidate his obligations. A charge was pre-ferred against him for leaving the country with the design to evade the payment of his just debts. A writ was issued by or under the direction of a celebrated archee at Ogden, and the Danite sheriff with whom Cornwall had had the prior difficulty de-puted to serve it. The man was overtaken and brought back; but his proof was so conclusive as to his real intention, that after giving bond with approved security, he was set at liberty, and again started on his peadling tour.

The first effort having failed, an account was presented by the archee himself against him, and the same sheriff, with one of the peculiar stripe, despatched to re-arrest and bring him back. He was overtaken at Echo canyon, brought back as far as Round valley, and there murdered? Of course the writ was returned with the proper endorsements, and the two brave (!) men, both well armed, satisfied the public with the statement that they had to shoot him in self-defence while he was resisting the due process of law. Two policemen in a civilized community, would have met the austere reproof of the humane judge if they had so much as used their bludgeons on a prisoner so hopelessly in their power as he was in that of the two Danites. So strong, however, is the power of custom in a community, that he was condemned as a worthless fellow, his murder approved, and the murderers elevated to the dignity of heroes .- Union Vedette.

A PATENT WELL .- A patent well is among the new inventions recently brought into practical use at the East. The process is so extremly simple, and, according to report, so effectual that it would seem as though it must soon come into general use. An iron tube is driven straight into the ground, just as one would drive a stake, and on reaching a depth at which any well would find water, a pump is attached to the end of the tube remaining above the ground, and up comes the water. Of course it is applicable only to soil free from rock and boulders; as it is in such soil only that an instrument of that kind could be driven to the required depth. The principle is obvious.—By working the pump in that portion of the tube above round a vacuum is formed in a sand and gravel between the pump valve and the bottom of the tube, upon which the water flows; proving, more over, that the atmospheric pressure is as continuous down through the pores of the earth until it reaches the water-level, as it is upon the water-surface above ground. The principle is an old one, and has been practiced in many parts of Africa and West-ern Asia from time immemorial. The natives of those regions, where water is found near the surface, but where the sandy character will not allow of its standing on the surface, are in the habit of digging little pits until they reach a moist point, when a number of rushes are inserted and the sand carefully packed around them until the excavation is filled to

the hight of the bunch of rushes when F. the mouth is applied and by vigorous suction sufficient moisture is obtained to quench thirst-thus affording another illustration of the oft-repeated and generally true saying, that there's nothing new under the sun. We understand that some experiments with the tube have been made in the vicinity of Stockton, to this state, but with success we are not informed .- M. S.
