New York, Nov. 1 .- The Matamoras correspondence of the Herald, dated October 25th, states that the attack on Matamoras commenced the Sunday previous by the Liberals. The fact of their being led upon the town in three lines of battle, led to the belief that they were commanded by American officers, as they had never formed that way

Washington, Nov. 3 .- The following dis-patch from the President to the Governor

of Georgia, has been pub ished: Washington, Oct. 28.-To Provisional Governor of Georgia: The people of Georgia should not hesitate a single moment in repudiating every dollar of debt created to aid the rebellion against the Government of the United States. It will not do to levy and collect taxes from a State and people who are ready to pay debts created to aid in making war and subverting the Constitution of the United States. I don't believe the great mass of the people of Georgia when left uninfluenced, will ever submit to the payment of a debt which was the main cause of bringing on their past and present sufferings. The result of the rebel-lion is that those who invested capital in this debt must lose is, and take it as one of the inevitable results of rebellion, though, it may seem hard to them. The idea should inculcated at home and abroad that no debt contracted for the purpose of dissolving the Union, can or will be paid by taxes levied on the people for such purposes.

New York, Nov. 3.—Dr. Durrett, quarantine Surgeon, reports 10 deaths from cholera, out

of fifty or sixty cases on board the Atlanta, New York, Nov. 6.—The Herald's Washington correspondent says that though the members elect to Congress from the South have not been placed on the Clerk's initial roll of representatives, it is regarded as a fact that sents will ultimately be granted to all whose respective States have repudiated the war debt and have adopted the anti-slavery amendmenti if they can take the test oath of 1862. This announcement is given, semi-officially (?) to the politicians South that they may take due notice thereof, and govern themselves accordingly. It will also be questioned whether the President's pardon does not over-rule the test oath, and make the recipient eligible to official position.

New York, Nov. 6 — The Savannah Herald of the 1st says: The officials of Savannah de-

clare the city again under civil authority.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—A Toronto, Canada West, correspondent to-day denies the truth of the telegram in regard to the Fenian excitement in Canada. It says there is no excitement there whatever. The feeling is that the Gov-ernment is able to deal with any Fenian project that may be batched here or elsewhere.

New York, November 6 -Havana files per Columbia have particulars regarding the re-bellion in Jamaica.

The City of Kingston is in great excitement. Business is entirely suspended there. Immense meetings, under the order of the Governor have been held. The sebellion raged with great fary in St. Thomas.

New York, Nov. 7.—Returns from a num-ber of towns and cities in the State show a falling off in the Democratic vote as com pared with last fall. Gen. F. C. Barlow Union, is certainly elected Secretary of State by a large majority. The whole State ticket is elected.

New York, Nov. 7, 11:30 p. M. -Nearly com-plete returns from this city give Slocum, democrat, over 20,000 majority, being a democratic loss of 13,000 compared with the vote of last year. His majority in this city

will be about 25,000.

Boston, Nov., 7.—The State election was held to-day. The vote is small; about twothirds of that of last year. The returns in-dicate a larger proportional loss to the dem-ocra's. The vote of the State will not probably exceed 100,000, of which Bullock will receive from 75,000 to 80,000 and Couch less than 25 000. Gen. Banks is elected to Congress in the Sixth District, to fill a vacancy.

New York, Nov. 7.—Returns from New Jer-sey almost invariably exhibit Union gains over the vote of last year. There is not much doubt of the election of Marcus L. Ward, (Union) for Governor, over Runyon, (Demo-erat) by a majority of 3,000 to 5,000. The returns also show a Union gain of Assem-

blymen. Baltimore, Nov. 7 .- The vote in Baltimore is very light. There was very little opposi-Less than 30,000 were cast. Thomas is elected in the Second District to Congress, to fill a vacany occasioned by the resignation

of Col. Webster. Chica, o, Nov. 7 .- Returns from Minnesota indicate the election of Marshall, Union candidate for Governor, by a large majority.

ISAAC SMITH is the Union candidate in Polk county to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Capt. Lafollet.
