### Atlantic News.

Washington, Nov. 7.—The National Intelligence, in noticing a visit to the President yesterday of a delegation of ladies from Baltimore, and the presentation of a petition numerously signed, seeking the clemency of the Executive in behalf of Jeff. Davis, says the interview was a protracted one, and of a most agreeable character. The fair petitioners left the city carrying with them a most pleasurable impression of the President. He regretted that the national character of the question restrained all private sympathy which they might awaken. He made the important statement that complete arrangements had been made for the early legal trial of Davis according to the laws of the land.

Milwaukee, Nov. 8.—Returns from seventeen precincts, including the principal cities, gives Fairchild, (Union) for Governor, 1,687 majority. The result of the vote upon negro suffrage is doubtful. The vote for the extension of suffrage in seventeen precincts is 500 behind the ticket.

New York, Nov. 7.—The Times says General Longstreet, while in this city, declared that the rebellion would have succeeded if it had not been for the incapacity of Jeff. Davis, whose intermeddling destroyed all their hopes, and that on several occasions he prevented the rebels from taking Washington and making it their base of offensive operations.

New York, Nov. 8.—John Mitchell arrived in this city yesterday, took the oath of American citizenship, obtained passports, and said he was not going to London.

New York, Nov. 8.—Pardon applications are on the increase. Four hundred were received yesterday from Georgia, and two hundred from North Carolina.

New York, Nov. 8.—The New York Herald publishes a summary of Governor Marvin's message to the Florida Reconstruction Convention. Gov. Marvin does not think it would be wise to confer the privileges of voting on negroes. He believes Congress will not command it as an indispensable primary to the admission of Representatives, but urges upon the Convention, as a matter of plain justice as well as wisdom, that laws for the most complete protection of Freedmen's civil rights be passed, and that their testimony be received in the courts. Without these, he says, the colored people will have no safeguard against the imposition of cruel or dishonest employers with them. He thinks the emancipated people will be generally contented, industrious and enterprising, even in the absence of the exercise of the ballot. He also recommends that the Convention declare the secession ordinance not repealed but ruled void. He favors the adoption by the Legislature of the amendment prohibiting slavery.

### Foreign News.

Halifax, Nov. 7.—Lord Palmerston was buried at Westminster Abbey on the 27th. The Queen and Cabinet were present. Parliament and the Diplomatic body were also largely represented. Immense crowds thronged the streets through which the funeral procession passed.

The Morning Post is apparently going into opposition. It says: "The feeling of the country toward Earl Russell's ministry will be one of total apathy. The country will see little to praise or condemn. It will be no easy matter to reconstruct his government in the House of Commons, but he must certainly introduce some fresh element to restrain the majority."

The Advertiser thinks it will be impossible for Gladstone to work the House of Commons successfully without more help than usual.

The Herald says: "If Russell should make any Radical move, Conservatives certainly will lose no opportunity to checkmate him."

The Archbishop of Paris was visiting the cholera hospitals.

A council of Ministers was held on the 26th.
