GENEROUS NEGROES .- The Negro Convention which assembled at Spcrements the other day, represented a total population of 3,425 negroes. If it lacked a constituency, the Convention proved by its action that it did not lack either sympathy or de-termination. The representatives of the 3,500 colored people promised 40,000 negro soldiers to aid the Irish in obtaining the independence of Ireland-an exhibition of generosity we have never before seen equalled. How 40,000 is to come out of 3,500 is not explained. Moreover, the delegations to the Convention felt very bad because the Hungarian Poles have not secured their independence. Considering that the Polanders, in their late rebellion, rebelled against Russia because the latter Power had pronounced against human slavery, we consider the action of the Negro Convention as positive proof of the capacity of the negro race to manage the affairs of the world, as well as evidence of its determined hostility to slavery. The representatives of 3,500 whites would not have promised 40,000 soldiers in aid of a certain movement, and might not have insisted upon controling all the affairs of Europe. The action of the negro Convention is positive evidence of negro superiority, for its members have gone farther in the way of promises than white men think of going. The representatives of 3,500 constituents not only show their capacity to regulate the affairs of the world, but promise 40,000 soldiers to aid a particular cause—that is, twelve soldiers for each individual of the total population .- S. F. Call.

CURIOUS REGULATIONS .- Brevet Major General Saxton is the Assistant Commissioner of Freedmen for the States of South Carolina and Georgia. He has recently issued a series of regulations in relation to the institution of marriage among the freedmen and women, which have been jocosely called "Saxton's Eleventh Com-mandment." We subjoin the tenth and eleventh as fair speciments of the whole:

Tenth-A husband living with a wife, having no children by her, may be permitted to take a previous wife, provided:

1-He have children by such wife who are still minors.

2-That such wife have no other husband known to be living.

3-That his present wife assent to such change of their marriage relations.

Eleventh-If a former wife utterly refuse, upon application made by the husband, to renew her former mar-riage relation with him, he may notify some society or church of the fact of such refusal, and ask for a release from said wife. If, after due notice given by such society or church to the wife refusing, she fail to show any moral or legal objection, as provided for in these regulations, to the renewal of her forme tions with him, then the society or church acting in the case shall grant to the man release from all his obligations to her as a husband, and for the support of all his children by her.

THE Siamese twins, from Surrey county, North Carolina, owing to the ravages of the late war, have been so embarrassed financially, as to necessitate their re appearance in public. They commenced exhibiting last month.

THE South Carolina Convention has refused to allow negroes to form any part of the basis of Congressional representation.

JUDICIAL OPINION.—In delivering a decision in the United States District Court, Boston, in 1862, Judge Sprague said:

It has been supposed that after the rebellion is suppressed the Govern-ment will have the rights of conquest; that a State and its inhabitants may be permanently divested of all political privileges, and treated as foreign territory acquired by arms. This is an error—a grave and dangerous error. Under despotic Governments, the power of municipal confiscation may be unlimited; but under our Government the right of sovereignty over any portion of a State is given and limited by the Constitution, and will be the same after the war as it was before. When the United States take possession of the Rebel District, they acquire no new title, but merely vindicate that which previously existed.

LEDGES IN THE VOLCANO DISTRICT .-Mr. I. D. Huntoon has brought down from Volcano some speciments of rock that for surface croppings, promise exceedingly well for that locality. In the way of opening claims there has been almost nothing done, but some essays of surface rock are equal to anything yet found, consider-ing the width of ledges. The Bullion is five feet wide and has assayed \$600 per ton. A tunnel is now being run into this ledge with the purpose of working it with the Defrees & Baker mill. The "John Huntoon" is a ledge which comes above the ground twelve feet wide and shows a superior charactor of rock. The "State of Maine" is fifteen feet wide and assays \$500 per ton. These are certainly good indications .- Idaho Statesman.
