New York, Nov. 10.—The order for the execution of Wirtz is exciting more remarks and occupying the public mind to a much greater degree than did the hanging of the conspirators. This is probably due to the fact of the notice given in this instance, while in the case of the former execution, scarcely more than ten hours of daylight intervened between the public announcement and the appearance of the condemned on the scaffold. Wirtz is said to be in better condition to-day than at any time during his confinement. He has had considerable sleep, and has a moderate appetite. He appears to show much stamina as the hours of his life approach their close. His spiritual adviser, Father Beerle, was with him during much of the afternoon, and left his cell about six this afternoon. Schrade also visited him, after an hour's interview of the former with President Johnson this morning. The interview is known to have been productive of nothing to indicate that Wirtz would be reprieved, though on the streets and in the hotels, the popular opinion seems to be gradually settling in that conviction. President Johnson is known to have met the petition of Schrade for a commutation of sentence with kind attention and regard, but said nothing to induce a belief that Executive clemency would be extended in the Wirtz case, nor did Schrade entertain a shadow of hope.

New York, November 11.—The following is the sentence of Gen. Briscoe: "The Court does therefore sentence him, Brevet Brig. Gen. Briscoe, Col. of the 199th Pennsylvania, to be cashiered, dishonorably discharged from the United States service, and forever disqualified from holding any office of honor or profit under the United States Government; that he forfeit all pay and allowance now due, or which may become due to him, and be confined at hard labor, in such place as the Secretary of War may direct, for five years.

"The findings and sentence are approved and confirmed. By the high testimonials of the former good character and gallantry of Gen. Briscoe by General's Meade, Hancock, Stoneman, Gibbon, Terry, Schless and others, so much of the sentence as pertains to confinement is remitted.

"By order of the President. (Signed) E. D. TOWNSEND, A. A. G." About noon Briscoe was released. He was highly elated at his escape from imprisonment, as he fully expected to be sent to the penitentiary.

New York, Nov. 10.—The Times' special says all reports about Cabinet discussion over the correspondence between Earl Russell and Minister Adams, are absurd, that the correspondence was in the hands of the Government several weeks before it was published, and that Secretary Seward had written a reply to Russell's last dispatch at least six weeks since. It is generally understood he informed the English Government that we shall not press the suggestion of arbitration, nor shall we consent to submit any question to the direction of a commission, unless old claims at issue between the two Governments shall be submitted. Also, it is probable that prior to sending Secretary Seward's dispatch a request was made to know what topics were intended to come before the commission suggested by Russell, as a necessary preliminary to the acceptance or declination of it.

Washington, Nov. 9.—A dispatch to the Secretary of the Treasury, dated Galveston, Nov. 4th, announces the death of Wm Johnson, only brother of the President, from the effects of a gunshot wound.

Washington, Nov. 10.—Capt. Wirtz was hung between 10 and 11 o'clock this morning. On the gallows he declared his innocence, and died without exhibiting any symptoms of fear.

DETAINED.—Last Spring large quantities of goods were taken to Kootenai, and with the depletion of the population in those mines, it was found necessary to remove them to Blackfoot to find a market. Being in law British goods, from having paid British duties, they are liable to confiscation upon coming back into the United States without paying duties under our revenue laws. An agent of the Port Angeles custom-house was sent up to Blackfoot to watch this very matter, and now has in keeping several pack-trains loaded with goods from Kootenai, at the Jocko Reservation. Among those under duress is "French Levy," who is well known in this country. It is a hard case all around, that men should buy goods—pay British duties and freight to Kootenai—then pay freight to Blackfoot, and then have their goods taken from them. Such is life in the mountains.
