

SPEECH OF HON. JOHN CONNESS.

Fellow-Citizens:—The demands upon my time for the consideration of measures connected with our interests, have been so great that I preferred to leave for my field of labors quietly; but the man who could refuse to return his thanks for such a demonstration as this, must have a heart of stone. I thank you, fellow-citizens, for this evidence of your regard and confidence. You have taken me by surprise. I do not appropriate this demonstration to myself personally, but look upon it as an indorsement of my services and course as your representative, [Cheers.] When I took my departure before, our country was struggling to throttle an unrighteous but mighty Rebellion. Slavery had risen to destroy Liberty. An aristocracy which had grown rich and arrogant in traffic of human beings, had raised its hand to crush free labor. A portion of our people who have received a large share of Government favors, had drawn the sword with fiendish purposes, to serve a bond of union which God and the Fathers of the Republic intended should be eternal. Let us, looking up to this starry mirror of heaven this beautiful night, thank God that the Rebellion is overthrown, that liberty, free labor and self-government have triumphed, and our Nation feared and respected by all the proudest and strongest on earth. [Loud and continued applause.] Notwithstanding the war is over, it is no time to slacken our energies. I look upon next Congress as one of the most important to the future welfare of the Republic, that we have had. The great principle which consolidated the Union people during the war, was the unconditional overthrow of the Rebellion. The great principle which ought to actuate us now is to see that the fruits of victory are not lost. [Cheers.] Our noble President, who had conducted the affairs of the Nation through four years of one of the most desperate wars that ever existed, was stricken down by the hand of an assassin just as the dove of peace was returning. You and all of us had confidence in him; let us have that same confidence in his worthy successor, and all will be well. [Three cheers for Johnson.] The policy and course of President Johnson commends itself to every calm-thinking man. So far, I see no reason to differ with him. [Applause.] I shall accord to this Administration my earnest support so long as it pursues that course which in my judgment is calculated to promote the interest of the whole people, and from my knowledge of the man and the tried statesmen who compose his Cabinet, I have no doubt but that the policy of the Administration on the great questions that must arise, will be wise, prudent, and as satisfactory to the great mass of the Union people. Therefore, my friends, have faith in the President, in Congress, and your Representatives; they are conscious of the responsibility that rest upon them, and will not disappoint you. [Cheers.] I have not seen fit, during my return, to promulgate any ideas of my own on National questions, but I can assure you that my mind has not been idle. I have studied these questions and closely watched coming events, and when they arise during the next Congress my course will be governed by what I consider the best interest of the Nation and the States I in a part represent. [Applause and cheers.] Again, fellow-citizens, I thank you for this kind farewell, feeling assured by this demonstration that your faith in the Republic is too strong to be weakened by rebellion, and your faith in the stability and prosperity of San Francisco too strong to be shaken by earthquakes. I leave on the steamer on Monday next; probably I shall not have an opportunity of seeing most of you again, so I bid you farewell till I return. [Tremendous applause.]
