New York, Nov. 13.—General Fisk and Chaplain French addressed a meeting last evening on the condition of the freedmen of the South. They stated there was suffering in Kentucky, Alabama and Georgia, and unless immediate assistance was given, 2,000 would die in those States alone during the coming Winter, of cold and starvation. The condition of the negroes in Tennessee, is represented as better than in the other States South.

New York, Nov. 13.—The Commercial's Washington special says Secretary McCulloch is now in strict retirement, engaged in the preparation of his report.

Lat at rumors from the Treasury Department is that he will suggest the best possible legislation, and will show the feasibility of so handling the debt of the country as to insure its redemption at no very distant day. There are also rumors that the Secretary will recommend such legislation as will make it imperative on the National Banks to redeem their bills at New York. This will force many of them to contract their circulation.

New York, Nov. 13.—The World's special says: It is understood that Sir Frederick Bruce, British Minister, will be selected as umpire by the joint commission to adjust claims between the United States and the Columbian Government.

New York, Nov. 14.—The Times' Washington special says Edward McPherson, the Clerk, will not enter the names of those elected to Congress by the rebel States on the roll of the next House.

The Tribune's special says: Judge Hunter has condemned the Governor of Mississippi's personal property for confiscation. His real estate is not worth that formality.

The total number of sick and wounded in Government Hospitals throughout the country is less than 5,000. Eight months since there were over 100,000.

Gen. Augur has issued an order forbidding the whipping of colored men under any law of Virginia within the limits of his department. General Ingraham, late Provost Marshal General of the defenses north of the Potomac, is being vigorously urged for Sergeant-at-Arms of the next House.

The Herald's Washington special says: It is understood that Preston King has resigned his position as Collector of the port of New York.

The mustering out of detachments of the veteran reserve corps in the District of Columbia begins to-day.

Gen. Logan will not accept the mission to Japan under any circumstances.

The World's special says: A telegram from Gov. Holden indicates that he is elected by a small majority.

New York, Nov. 14.—Thurlow Weed states that Preston King, Collector of the Port, was seen to jump off a ferry boat yesterday morning by a little boy and girl. They picked up his hat, which has been handed to Weed and recognized. There are no traces of the body yet.

New York, Nov. 13.—The World's Columbia correspondent under date of Nov. 7th, says: Resolutions were reported from the Committee on Federal Relations to the Legislature to the effect that South Carolina had fully complied with the requirements of the amnesty proclamation of President Johnson, and having emancipated her slaves is entitled to the benefits of the said amnesty, and acknowledging their position as a conquered people and accepting the terms offered them, they ask the withdrawal of military rule to which they say the Government stands pledged. The report says: They have with honest purpose and entire loyalty of heart, given solemn pledges to be henceforth loyal citizens. The resolutions will probably be adopted unanimously.

Foreign News.

Farther Point, Nov. 13.—The Belgian from Liverpool on 2d, and Londonderry on 3d, has arrived.

The British Parliament has been further prorogued until the 23d.

Election returns show the position of parties in the Italian Parliament as follows. Moderates, 266; Constitution, 100; Clerical rights, 9; doubtful, 86.

The Journal de Roma says the Pope has relieved M. Meroni of his functions for some particular reasons, especially ill health, without withdrawing his affection and esteem.

California News.

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—About three o'clock this morning the night clerk at the What Cheer House, Seward H. Baker, while in the office of the hotel, fronting on Sacramento street, heard a noise at the Leidesdorff street door. He proceeded to see what was the cause, and had reached the passage way, when he was suddenly seized by two men who choked him for a moment, and then struck him over the head a terrible blow, which completely stunned him, and then dragged his lifeless body into a small recess, and threw him under a desk. The night

watchman had just the moment before gone to the dining room. When the ruffians seized Baker, he screamed once for help, calling the watchman by name. He hurried to the office but not seeing the clerk, alarmed he house, when the apparently lifeless body of Baker was found where it had been placed by the robbers after they had knocked him down. They rifled his pockets of a small amount of money, and obtained the keys to the safe, which they opened without difficulty, but probably they were disturbed by the watchman, for they left \$1,200 plainly exposed to view. It is thought the amount stolen will not fall short of \$20,000. It consisted of deposits made by boarders. Baker is the only man who knows what was in the safe, and he has not sufficiently recovered to ascertain the exact amount. The perpetrators have not been discovered. The whole detective force are employed on the case. It is probable that the loss will fall upon Mr. Woodward, the proprietor of the What Cheer House.

San Francisco, Nov. 14.—The What Cheer House robbery still remains a mystery. Mr. Woodward offers \$2,000 for the apprehension and conviction of the robbers.

Yesterday at noon the residence of George Redding, on the Petros, was entered by a burglar, and a trunk in Redding's room broken into, from which the burglar abstracted \$990 in gold coin, and some silver ware valued at \$100. From the manner in which the doors and trunk were forced, the robber is supposed to have been a Chinaman.

The steamer Del Norte, which arrived today from Crescent City, brought the body of Elijah S. Mott, Chief Engineer of the late Brother Jonathan.
