**MONTANA NEWS.**—Mr. Samuel Brooks, a citizen of the Dalles, has just returned from Montana Territory. He left Blackfoot City on the 31st of October, and reports that, at the time of his departure, snow had fallen in the mines to the depth of from six to ten inches. There was a little snow in spots in Deer Lodge Valley, and a light fall had occurred in Helgate Ronde, but had gone off, and the weather there was delightful. He found snow down the Hellgate Canyon to within ten miles of Big Blackfoot. In consequence of the cold weather, washing was pretty much suspended in the mines, but drifting operations continued with unabated energy.

The trade at Blackfoot City was quiet, and the following are the prices of leading articles: Four—Salt Lake, per hundred pounds, \$22; Oregon, \$25@26, and some talk of advancing the price to \$28; Bacon—cargo sales of Oregon at 50c; retailing at 60@65c; Lard—retailing at 60@70c; Beans, 40@45c; with sales of damaged and inferior at 35c; Butter—Isthmus, \$1; Ranch, \$1 50; Coffee—Rio, 90c, Cos a Rica, \$1; ground, \$1; Tea—common black, \$2 50; Japanese, \$2 75@3 25; choice green, \$3 50; Dried Fruit—States apples 62@65c; California peaches, 75c; States peaches, 65c; Sugar—Sandwich Island, 55c; S. F. refined, 65c; crushed, 75c; New Orleans, 60@65; Sirup—S. F. golden, 5 gallon kegs, \$27 50; Belcher's St. Louis, \$55 per 10 gallon keg; fresh beef was retailing at 18@65c per pound. The new diggings on the tributaries of the Big Blackfoot are situated about fifty miles from Hellgate, between Helgate and Big Blackfoot rivers. Most of the ground yet proven to be good is on the tributaries of Elk Creek, which flows out of the dividing ridge between the two rivers, and empties into Big Blackfoot river, ten miles below Stevens Prairie. Diggings, on the same range, have been found north of the Big Blackfoot. These new discoveries are fifty miles this side of the Little Blackfoot mines, and are by that distance closer to the sources of supply on the Pacific side. There are about six hundred men in the new district, and they are generally very short of supplies, and need assistance of the principal conveniences of miner's life. These new mines are of particular importance to the commercial community on this side of the mountains, as they are nearly as close to the head of navigation on Snake river as to Fort Benton, and within a day's ride of Hellgate Valley—the agricultural district nearest to them. The prosperity of this valley secures a lucrative trade to this side in any event, and that prosperity is enhanced by the existence of such mines close to it.

Mr. Brooks brought back several fine specimens of gold quartz, and one specimen of galena, holding mechanically a large piece of gold. This is a combination hitherto, we believe, unheard of.

**THE COEUR D'ALENE MISSION.**—The Coeur d'Alene Mission, as at present located, was established in 1846, but prior to that time priests of the Jesuit order had been employed in the work of civilizing and Christianizing the Coeur d'Alene Indians. At first the Fathers attempted to establish themselves on the St. Joseph River, but the back water from the Coeur d'Alene Lake prevented them from going forward with the improvements. At the time above stated they moved over on to the Coeur d'Alene River, and in the midst of a rich body of agricultural lands, commenced anew their work of establishing the arts of peace among their savage neophytes. The Mission Church building stand, upon a knoll, surrounded on all sides by a rich, low, flat alluvial coming into the valley from the west, the church is seen at the upper end of the valley, facing to the north. In the rear stands the residence of the Fathers—a rustic cottage, with overhanging eaves, and a narrow piazza around it. A hundred feet to the west is the refectory, and straggling around the sides of the knoll are fifty cabins and wigwams. In front of the church, and to the east, are considerable inclosures of ground, which have substantial rail fences. In these fields the labor of the Indians is employed, and their industry encouraged by fair wages and kind treatment. The timber on the mountain

slopes comes down to the edge of the alluvial lands, and gives the valley a peculiarly sombre and lonely aspect. The church, which is built of wood, is cast on the model of Michael Angelo's rustic church called San Miniato on the Hill. By observing the proportions of the model, even this rude structure has the same air of loftiness, and yet rusticity, which has given the original a world-wide reputation. At this Mission lives the Father Gazzoli, who has spent thirty years among the Coeur d'Alenes. He is assisted by the young Father Giuseppe Caruapa, who has recently come out from Italy. Of the life of self-sacrifice led by these champions of the Cross it is not necessary to speak. The world has heard of their labors, and imagination can easily figure a man in black—with no weapon but the Cross—without care for food or raiment—seeking only to do what he believes to be the Master's work. The most cynical unbeliever might have his theories shocked by meeting one of these men on his errand of mercy; leaving behind a princely fortune—the smiles of courts—the blandishments of pleasure, and traveling alone and unattended—eating of the scantiest fare, and dressed in the habiliments of poverty, all from a belief that the unfading pleasures of another world will compensate him for the sacrifices made in this.
