New York, Nov. 14.—The propeller, *Montana*, from New York for San Francisco, was at Rio Janeiro Oct. 3d, after twenty-six days passage.

Raleigh, Nov. 16.—Official vote of the Fifth Congressional District, shows that Bedford Brown is elected over Hawes by 96 votes.

Philadelphia, Nov. 14.—Washington L. Lane, editor of the *Leader*, died this morning.

New York, Nov. 15.—The *Times*' special says: Two companies of Hancock's corps, stationed at Albany, were dispatched to Burlington yesterday. It is supposed they are destined for Maine.

The *World's* Washington special says that Gen. Sanborn has been appointed by the President, Agent to harmonize the freedmen made free in the Choctaw and Cherokee nations by the recent Indian treaty.

Lawrence, Kansas, Nov. 14.—Col. Graves, special Indian Agent, and Col. Dodd, Agent for the Navajos, left here to-day with a train of twenty-five wagons laden with agricultural implements and a quantity of goods and presents for that tribe. About 8,000 Navajos have agreed to settle on Pecos river and abandon their wild savage life.

New York, Nov. 15.—The *Tribune's* special dispatch says: By order of the Secretary of War, the name of Fort Richmond, New York harbor, will be changed to Fort Wadsworth.

Philadelphia, Nov. 15.—The through train from Newark for Washington, which left at 8 o'clock this morning, ran through the turntable of the New Jersey Railroad. Two men were killed and several injured.

A Washington special says: Gen. Steele represents the Imperial force at Matamoros as completely beleaguered. He expresses the opinion that the French will be compelled to surrender to the Liberals who hold both banks of the river, and environ them on all sides. The Liberals have authentic information that three weeks ago the Imperialists were reduced to one-third rations, and they are completely cut off from Vera Cruz and Tampico.

The *Times'* Havana letter of November 8th, reports the defeat and capture of the Republican General Ortega, in Michoacan, and the destruction of his whole army. His troops were divided in three bodies to capture Morelia, and so they were beaten in detail and dispersed, 400 prisoners remaining in the hands of the Imperialists. The Republican General Diaz, is said to have led the attack on Morelia. Though at first successful, he was finally beaten. The Republican General Rosales was defeated at Alamos, in Sinaloa. The adhesion of Lower California to the Empire is announced.

New York, Nov. 15.—The steamer *Persia* from Liverpool on the 4th has arrived.

The Danish Ministry have resigned. The preliminaries of a treaty of commerce between England and Austria have been concluded.

Chicago, Nov. 20, 2:45 P. M.—The pirate *Shenandoah* arrived at Liverpool, and was surrendered to the British Government with her captain and crew. Signed, RANKIN, Agent of the Associated Press.

New York, Nov. 14.—The *Hartford Current* of yesterday, says it is informed semi-officially, that a company of marines from Canada crossed into Maine for the purpose of arresting deserters. The men refused to return with the officers, and application was made to the United States authorities to have them given up which was refused. There was danger of an outbreak.

Hancock's corps is ordered to rendezvous in Maine. A company attached to Hancock's corps in that city, left for Augusta, Maine, on Saturday evening. The *Hartford Post* says the company left the city on Sunday for Augusta, it is rumored either to prevent the Fenians from entering Canada, or to prevent British soldiers from capturing deserters from their army who have fled to the United States.

New York, Nov. 14.—The *Herald's* Milledgeville dispatch says: The new constitution of Georgia, constructed by the State Convention, was adopted as a whole Nov. 6th. As it was adopted the State debt contracted to aid the rebellion is repudiated.

New York, Nov. 16.—A fireman's riot occurred in Jersey City this evening. Several persons were injured. The riot was quelled by the sheriffs and some arrests made.

Richmond papers say that at the opening of the United States District Court in Richmond, Nov. 14, Martin F. Conway was the only lawyer who could be admitted to practice. No others have taken the necessary oath.

A special dispatch to the *Tribune* says that the rebels defeated all the Union candidates in Northern Alabama. Frank H. Guiley, the murderer of Gen. McCook, was elected sheriff of Madison county. Rev. J. P. Morris who declared that he could not take the oath, and any man who could was a black hearted traitor to the South, was elected to Congress from Madison District.
