Atlantic News.

New York, Nov. 16.—Gen. Grant visited the Union League last night. He was welcomed by Vice President Buckman, who, after thanking him for his victories, alluded to the foul wrong committed by the French in occupying Mexico. Grant replied: "There is one sentiment in your address which is mine also—the one touching the future of Mexico." This was received with cheers. Speeches were made by Generals Meade, De Trobriand and others.

A gentleman who arrived to-day says: Smugglers have been unusually active during the past three months.

Fuller, who used the name of Senator Marlan to obtain a charge of money belonging to the National Union Commission, and who has been in the old Capitol for several months, was released without trial.

The *Times'* special says: Freeman Clark, Comptroller of the Treasury, is engaged on his report. He will recommend the removal of the currency bureau to New York. Secretary McCulloch, who made the same recommendation when Comptroller last year, will probably renew the recommendation in his report as Secretary of the Treasury.

Yesterday the Government refunded the money derived from the proceeds of confiscated property, in pursuance of the act of March, 1865. The case in which the money was refunded, is one in which the claimants, former owners of confiscated property, show that they were loyal citizens, and supporters of the Union, notwithstanding the fact of the abandonment of their property at the outbreak of the rebellion. The property is located at Alexandria, Va. A large number of such cases are pending and under way.

Contracts will soon be consummated for mail service in the various States, to go into effect on the 1st of January, 1866, and expire June, 1867. The bids made for the service have been slightly in excess of the rates formerly in vogue on the same routes.

Nathaniel H. McLean, formerly Assistant Adjutant General to General Burnside, who was ordered to the Pacific coast two years ago, as he alleges, to prevent his testifying against Hesh, then about to be court-martialed in Cincinnati, is preparing to bring his case before Congress, and promises to throw much light on that transaction.

The *Times'* special dispatch says: Governor Parsons left for home yesterday with two hundred pardons for citizens of Alabama.

Admiral Porter will soon publish a reply to Gen. Banks' strictures on the conduct of the navy in the Red river campaign.

The *Tribune's* special says: The President is more than usually annoyed by pardon seekers to-day. He remarked that he tried to overwhelm the South with pardons and kindness, but from the turn of events he began to think them incapable of appreciating magnanimity.

Several efforts have been made to force a belligerent construction upon the action of the Navy Department in ordering off to certain places ships of war. The facts are that sundry naval vessels have been ordered to foreign and domestic stations the same as in the years before the war, instead of allowing them to rot in the navy yards.

The *Tribune's* Fort Smith, Arkansas, correspondent says the rebel Choctaw and Chickasaw Indians are waging a terrible persecution against the colored population. Since the Council held at this place the Indians are incensed because they must submit to emancipation, and determined to vent their malice upon the blacks who have been their slaves. They abuse them in every way they can, beating some to death and shooting others. The negroes are coming to this Fort for protection.

New York, Nov. 16.—The *Montezuma* from Kingston, Jamaica, has arrived. Gen. O'Connor has assumed command of the British troops and the Volunteers called out by the Governor General.

The *Commercial's* Washington letter says the appointment of Gen. Logan as Minister to Mexico is believed here to be based on the promise that the French troops shall be withdrawn from Maximilian's dominions at the same time that the United States Army of Observation shall be withdrawn from the Rio Grande, and armed emigrants to Mexico will be discontinued.

Washington, Nov. 16.—The Government is kept advised on the subject of the cholera abroad. The latest dispatches show that it is disappearing from Palermo and spreading over the peninsula of Spain and Portugal.

New York, Nov. 16.—A special dispatch to the *Herald*, dated Toronto, Oct. 16 h, says that intense excitement prevailed yesterday. The Governor placed troops at the disposal of the Mayor, who informed him of a probable early attack on the city, and gave instructions to take as many prisoners as possible. On Tuesday night Col. Leary's house was pelted with brickbats.

To-day's *Leader* says: Great preparations have been made—such as posting troops and patrols, doubling the police force, etc., and the horses of the Royal artillery are con-

tinually harnessed and held in readiness. Many discharged American soldiers are in the city, and an attack might be looked for. Mayor Gunther was renominated last evening by the McKean wing of the Democracy. John W. Farmer was nominated by what is called the "Army and Navy League." The *Post's* Washington dispatch says: The President has recently decided to issue rations to the suffering freedmen of the Southern States during the coming winter, and also to take such white persons as may be destitute. The President has recently declared that freedmen shall have full protection in their right to settle on the public lands of Florida and Texas, now open for pre-emption.
