

THE REASON.—The Idaho World remarks that the reason shown for the jealousy of the San Francisco press, in general, towards the mines on the waters of the Columbia is accounted for by the fact that the moneyed men of California have many millions invested in the mines east of the Sierra Nevada and south of Humboldt. It becomes necessary, in consequence of this fact, for the press to labor unceasingly to keep down favorable reports from other quarters, lest the depleted mining population of their mines should be still further thinned out. The propriety of this policy should be conceded by the public press in this part of the country, and we should rely on our own means of reaching the people of other sections with information of our resources, and inducements to money and labor to come among us.

The stream-tin at Owyhee has encouraged prospecting until a lode charged with oxides of tin has been discovered. The Idaho Statesman says the lode is two miles up Jordan Creek, from Ruby City, and is two hundred feet wide.

An honest miner, on the road to Blackfoot, said that he had prospected about every stream on the Pacific slope, and when he dies he proposes to try the saps on the river Styx.

WOOL MANUFACTURERS' ASSOCIATION.
An association, composed of the wool manufacturers of the United States, has held its annual meeting at Philadelphia, and has formed an alliance with the iron and coal interests of Pennsylvania to support a high protective tariff. Indeed, Henry C. Carey, the well known protectionist, declares that the conflict through which we have just passed is a national blessing, because it has made high tariffs necessary. "we have," said he, "gone through a little bit of a squabble, nothing more. It has cost us three or four hundred millions of dollars, but it is really worth to us twenty hundred millions. It is the first time in the history of the world that war has proved a great benefit." This extraordinary language plainly denotes that an attempt is to be made at the coming session of Congress to increase the duties on iron and to retain cheap wool on the free list. The Association has as its Secretary Jos. L. Hayes, originally of Boston, but for some years past a resident of Washington City, where he was a successful lobbyist until made Chief Clerk of the Patent Office on the accession of Lincoln to power—a place which he retained until Secretary Harlan commenced his work of reform. The largest woolen mill is that of the Pacific Company, at Lawrence, Mass., which in 1864 consumed upwards of three million pounds of wool.

THE GROWTH OF AN OIL CITY.—The growth of Oil City is wonderful. Five years ago there was scarcely a hundred inhabitants; now the estimate is 8,000. Buildings are going up with surprising rapidity. One real estate agent sold two hundred building lots recently at an average price of \$2,500 per lot. Petrolians predict a great city. There is neither a house for sale or a room to let at any price. The offices are completely covered with signs. It is not an unusual thing to a Petroleum Company, a Lawyer, a Physician, a Civil Engineer, and a Real Estate Agent, occupying a small office that is scarcely large enough to contain a desk, a table, a stove and four chairs. Each man has a square foot of room to transact business in; but this crowded state of things will be remedied somewhat. Lumber dealers from Cleveland and other places are arranging to deliver lumber at Franklin on short notice, and the late exorbitant sale of building lots indicates that there will be a heavy demand. The railroad is completed to Oil City, and will soon be in perfect running order. This will give a strong impetus to business. Oil has been accumulating in the shipping yards wonderfully. When the Alleghany breaks no less than 100,000 barrels will be awaiting transportation.—Oil City Monitor.
