

New Orleans, Nov. 18.—The Mississippi House of Assembly has partly revised its refusal to allow negro testimony against whites. It has now passed, by 47 to 43, a law adding to the previous law—that in cases in which they (negroes) offer themselves as witnesses they shall be parties to the record—the following: "And in cases in which they are parties both plaintiff and defendant, and in all criminal cases in which the offense charged was committed against the person or property of a freedman, free negro or mulatto so offered as a witness; Provided, no freedman, free negro or mulatto shall be examined as a witness in any case whatever, only upon the stand in open Court." The State Senate will doubtless adopt this section.

From Alabama we learn that the Congressmen elect are as follows: First District, C. C. Langdon; Second District, George C. Freeman; Third District, Cullen A. Battle; Fourth District, Joseph W. Taylor; Fifth District, Col. Snel. In the Sixth District the returns are incomplete.

Tallahassee, Florida, Nov. 18.—The Convention has annulled the Ordinance of Secession, abolished Slavery, declared all inhabitants of the State, without distinction of color, free, and that no person shall be incompetent to testify as a witness on account of color in any matter wherein a colored person is concerned. It also repudiated the State debt contracted in support of the rebellion, amended the Constitution in other respects, and adjourned.

New York, Nov. 22.—A special says a letter from an Alabama postmaster says the Union men are rigidly excluded from reconstruction conventions and official positions.

The World's special says the supposed object of the concentration of forces in the vicinity of Antonia, Texas, is for the purpose of looking after the French troops.

Efforts to secure the parole of C. C. Clay are unsuccessful. Several personal appeals have been made by Mrs. Clay. Great stress was laid on the statement that Clay voluntarily surrendered himself on hearing that he was charged with complicity in the assassination. The guards of soldiers that have been stationed around the White House for the last two years, were yesterday by order of President Johnson removed.

New York, Nov. 22.—At the Musical Hall last night Fernando Wood was nominated for Mayor, but declined. John Deckers was then nominated, and Richard O. Go man was nominated for Corporation Council. The latter nomination was made by the Tammany Democracy.

Washington, Nov. 21.—The consul at Marseilles represents to the State Department that the cholera has entirely disappeared from that city. Passengers going west from Marseilles have now an uninterrupted passage with their baggage to Paris.

Returns of the North Carolina election are not in, but it is expected that Worth is elected over Holden by 11,000 majority.

The Newbern Times says the truth is the whole South has been guilty of acts of the most stupendous nature, but not known to any of the people. It fears they will have to pay for it sorely by two years more of probation and suffering under military government, if then out; and the Legislature will accomplish what the Convention leaves undone. We can have a new election of men to Congress who are in favor of the Federals, and may get in during the session, otherwise all will be lost for the present.

New York, Nov. 20.—The Commercial's Washington special says the leading Union men are urging the consideration of financial matters at the opening of the session, leaving the admission of Southern members until after Christmas, by which time harmony will be assured.

Maj.-Gen Frederick Steel leaves on the California to-morrow, to assume command of Washington Territory, made vacant by the death of Gen. Wright.

New York, Nov. 20.—The steamship City of London, from Liverpool to the 8th and Queenstown the 9th has arrived.

The pirate Shenandoah arrived in the Mercury on the 6th and surrendered to the guardship Donegal. She is now in the hands of the naval authorities. Capt. Waddell states that the first information he received of the close of the war was on the 30th of August, from the British war vessel Baragouta, and that she immediately consigned her guns to the hold of the vessel and steered for Liverpool.

The London News says the Americans may be inclined to say that it was only fitting that her end should be British as her origin; but cannot help asking how she has been able to pursue her course without the least molestation from the American Navy. "Can it be possible that the expectation of recovering compensation for the losses, resulting from her depredations, from England, made the American Government less eager for her capture than she would have been otherwise?" and comes to the conclusion that it would be one of the strongest practical arguments against the admission of such liabilities against England.
