Epitome of Telegraphic News. [COMPILAD FROM THE OREGONIAN.] DATES TO NOVEMBER 23.

The Mercury says the representative of the American Government at this port has been kince the arrival of this vessel, in communication with the Cu tom autorities It is also stated that c rtain commercial houses, who were lately interested in the success of the Confederacy, we e engaged yesterday in making inquiries regarding the Shenandouh, and there may be, therefore, some point raised as to giving up the vessel. Some of the autorities have been communicated with, and their decision in legard to the final dispos tion of the vessel may be expected in a few days.

The French Government had a prosecution against the *opmion Nationale* for spreading news about Mexico calculated to disturb the public peace.

The *limes* continued to disparage the Rus-sell C-binet, and says it would almost seem as if there must be an in erval of disorganization, after which the Cabinet will go on with re. ew-d strength or go to pieces. The issue depends upon themselves, upon the boldness and wisdom of their policy, and upon their aptitude in a s milating to themselves the forces which lie about them.

Meetings have been held in Manchester and Paris in aid of the emancipated negroes in t e United States.

New York, Nov. 21.—The steamship China from Liv-rool the 11th, and Queenstown the 12th, has arrived.

The pirate Shenandoah has been handed over to the U. S. Consul and will be sent to New York Her captain and crew were unconditionally discharged.

Adattional correspondence between Minister Adams and Evri Russell has been published. The latter says that every represen-tation of the American Minister was immedistely considered and properly referred to the law officers. The supplement to the London Gazette con-

tains further additional correspondence betweet. Mr. Adams and Earl Russell, relative to the departure of cruisers for the rebels from England. Earl Russell repeats the argument that the British Government acted upon precede t, and presents memoranda showing that steps were taken to prevent and

punish breaches of netrality. The London Tomes says it is impossible for the American Government to abandon the claims for the depredations of the Alabama, but it is quite possible for a Government to yield nothing, yet do nothing. We must pre-pare to be told that the United States Government will abate no jot of its demands, and will reserve the right of enforcing them, but still, when the temper of the people is calmed, when commerce has renewed the links, there will be little disposition to dwell upon unavoidable difficulties.

Capt. Waddell, in his letter to Earl Russell, which is now published, says : " In obedience to orders I to: nd myself in the Arctic and Ochotsh seas, for away from ordinary channels of commerce, and in consequence of this awkward circum tance, was engaged in acts of war until the 28th of June. I was ignorant of the r verse suffered by the Confederates and the total obii e ation of the government under which I seted. I received the first news of the downfall of the Confederates on the 34 of August, from the British bark Barrac.nia, and desisted immediately from acts of war till I could communicate with European ports, and learn if the news was true. I could not have been sensible that the tales to d by the American ships were true, but merely upon the statement of the British Captain, I diligently sought for precedent in law for guidance in the future control and final disposal of the vessel, but found none,"

THE DALLES AND VANCOUVER ROAD .- The idea of building a road from Dalles to Van couver, for the purpose of facilitating movements of live.stock up and down the river, and particular y to benefit immigrants moving with considerable quantities of stock, is now much discu ded at Vancouver. An important accessory of this road is the tridge across the Columbia at the dalles of the river, above the city. Immigrants coming from the south- ast can avail themselves of this bridge for a cheap and speedy transit of the river, and it will serve the add tional purpose of a tracting hither the trade of settlers in the eastern section of Washington Territory. The two enterprise . have a com. mon interest, and should not the projectors not have an interchange of ideas upon the subject? It is by opening thoroughfares of this descript on that the country is built up; and inducements offered to settlers and the commercial public.
