HORACE GREERLEY thinks that when majorities and minorities do not agree, it is the fault of the majority. ALF. SLOCUM, Treasurer of Boise County, has been imprisoned for refusing to pay to Dr. E. Smith, Territorial Treasurer of Idaho, the amount due the territorial from Boise County. Dr. Smith has been commissioned by Caleb of the Dale as Territorial Treasurer, and his right to act is denied by the County authorities, who feel certain that the money is safe in Slocum's hands—hence his resistance.

MILITARY.—The Pacific brought to Vancouver last week, Col. C. S. Lovell, 14th U. S. Infantry, to command the Department; Capt. Hodges, A. Q. M., to succeed Capt. Weeks as Chief Quartermaster; Brevet Capt. Bainbridge, Regimental Quartermaster of the 14th Infantry, and Lieut. Downey, Dr. Wagner, 125 recruits for the 2d Battalion, 14th Infantry, and a regimental band of 25 pieces.

TO BE HUNG.—Kurtz, who murdered a Chinaman at Idaho City, has been sentenced to be hung on the 18th of January, 1866. It looks like a caricature of justice to hang a man for killing a Chinaman, after so many red-handed villains have gone unpunished for murdering white men, but it is never too late to make a good beginning in such matters. Kurtz probably deserves death as richly as any man now living. The murder was most dastardly in conception and execution.

ARRESTED.—Frank Williams and Daniels, alias "Hoosier Dan," were arrested at Portland, on suspicion of the robbery of the safe at the Orleans hotel, in Umatilla, on the 13th ult., by which robbery J. H. Beckham, a worthy and enterprising packer was deprived of \$3,500, and left almost destitute. The parties arrested had on deposit, and about their persons, about the amount lost by Mr. Beckham. As they are known to have been without money at Umatilla, and are men of bad antecedents, their committal to jail probably places the right men in the right place. They arrived at Dalles last night, on their way to Umatilla for examination.

THE UNITED STATES MAILS.—Col. Markland, the Special Postal Agent, will probably have some rather difficult questions in postal arithmetic to cipher out, if he gives the affairs in this country, belonging to the Department, much attention. He will have to reconcile many antagonistic interests, and dissect many one-sided statements. Of the first-mentioned class, he will be required to find out how a line which cost \$90,000 a year for four years should receive \$225,000 for one year. It will also puzzle him to account for the reason why the contractors did not throw up the job, by paying a forfeit of \$20,000, and kept on running at an implied annual loss of \$135,000 a year. He will also be expected to explain the advantage accruing to Oregon by having the mails carried from seven to fourteen days, out of the way, after they pass Salt Lake City, instead of having them brought direct from the Mormon metropolis overland in two days less time than is required to carry them to Sacramento, seven hundred miles out of the way. The most gigantic problem which he will be called upon to solve, will be to prove that three hundred thousand people are accommodated by the present mail arrangements between Lincoln and Portland, and the eminent propriety of sending the mails from the States by the way of Great Salt City, Sacramento and Portland, to be distributed in "a portion of Idaho and Montana." These are a few of the puzzles which he will be called upon to unravel. In advance, it is proper to give Col. Markland credit for some knowledge of the business upon which he comes to this country. Up to this time, we have not heard of his delivering temperance lectures, or theorizing on reconstruction, and other bewildering questions. These are good signs. We hope for further favorable developments of his ability and character.

THE CHICO ROUTE.—The S. F. Flag of the 16th of November contains the itinerary of a traveler from Boise to Dogtown, in California, which interesting narration comprises the brief period of "seventy-odd" days. It occupies over two newspaper columns, and its contents may be gathered from the "sub-heads," which run as follows: "Journal of a Stage Trip from Boise to Chico—Indians—Standing Guard—No Houses—No Stage Stations—Staging under Difficulties—Soldiers—Still on Guard—A Ghostly Place—New Companions—Danger Ahead—Team gives out—Awfully Cold—Grub Out—Rain and Snow—Passengers on Foot—Gloomy Prospects—Toad Town—Susanville and other Civilized Places—Reach the Settlements at Last—From Boise to Dogtown in Seventy-odd Days." As Yellow-plush would say, "Commenk is yewless."
