Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

DATES TO NOVEMBER 23.

Washington, November 26.—The greater portion of the President's message has been placed in type to-day. It will be completed in ample time to be delivered to distant cities by special messenger, to be handed to the press the day it is presented to Congress. The reports of the Secretaries of the Treasury and Interior are complete, and being placed in type.

New York Nov. 26.—The Herald says: This session of the U. S. Circuit Court, with either Chief Justice Chase or Judge Underwood presiding, has been ordered to commence at Norfolk, Va., to-morrow. It is thought by some that his business will be the trial of Jeff. Davis.

A letter from Georgia says, that the late rebel General Jordan is practicing law in Atlanta. Wheeler is in the commission business at Augusta; Gen. Garthell is practicing law in Atlanta; Gen. Anderson is in the commission business at the same place; Gen. Hardee is at Savannah and Howell Cobb at Macon.

Raleigh, Nov. 26.—The Legislature meets to-morrow. Large numbers have arrived. Governor Holden is still confined to his bed from sickness. Messrs. Poole, Reed, Holden and others are spoken of in connection with the Senatorship. It is thought the Constitutional Amendment will be ratified by the Legislature. Prominent gentlemen who have been to Washington are not very hopeful as to the future of the State and reconstruction.

New York, Nov. 27.—The Times special says a prominent member of the Senate Finance Committee announces his intention to urge upon Congress a reduction of Government taxes to the amount of full one hundred millions of dollars. He alleges that the revenue after this reduction shall have been made, will be sufficient to pay the expenses of the Government, besides leaving a large sum to be applied to the public debt. In making up the statistics of the Treasury Department, the fact is disclosed that in the fiscal years, ending June, respectively of 1862, 1863 and 1864, notwithstanding that we had 1,000,000 men in the field, and thus withdrawn from labor, we exported to foreign countries two and three quarter times more ham and bacon than in 1858, 1859 and 1860.

New York, Nov. 26.—A letter from El Paso, Oct. 9th, says: News has been received here that Gen. Brancourt, commanding the French in Chihuahua, had issued orders to his command to make necessary preparations for the evacuation of the city, preparing to concentrating his forces at Durank. The writer of the letter expected that the State of Chihuahua would be free from the French by the 1st of November. He says Juarez has received reports from the several commanders of the army of the Republic, that over 2,000 Mexicans will be summarily treated by the court martial of Maximilian, and condemned to death. The sentence in every case is speedily executed; there is no instance in which mercy is extended.

New York, Nov. 27.—The Herald's dispatch says a petition signed by many leading New York merchants and importers, recommending the appointment of Henry A. Smyth, of the Central National Bank, to the Collectorship, was, on Saturday, presented to the Secretary of the Treasury by a delegation in behalf of the signers, and was by the Secretary referred to the President for consideration.

Nearly all the privates in the reserve corps have been ordered by the late order of the War Department to leave the service, and have been mustered out in large numbers. The officers, however, have been kept in service. Most of them are utterly incapacitated to pursue their former business. As has been found from official reports now coming to the Department, and from other sources these officers remain in service and in order to obtain a place for them in the regular army, if it shall be determined to retain the veterans in that organization, an enabling act is proposed to be submitted to Congress, to be enacted into a law, which will provide for the admission of the veteran reserve officers, retaining their present grade and rank as near as can be, upon a certificate from the board of examiners of their competency and fitness for the position.

It is understood the Secretary of war favors this plan.

Gov. Hamilton in his proclamation calling the Texas Convention says: All qualified voters having taken the solemn oath, or being pardoned, are eligible, even if the oath was taken or they were pardoned subsequent to the election.

New Orleans, Nov. 20.—The test oath has been argued before the District Court here for two days. Judge Terrill intimated to-day that he considered the law was unconstitutional.

A Monroe, Louisiana paper speaks encouragingly of the prospects of the cotton planting in that section. The planters are disposed to give the freedmen a chance.

The same paper says that a large number of emigrants from Alabama and contiguous States are going to Texas.
