INSURRECTION IN JAMAICA-BRUTAL-ITY OF THE NEGROES.—The atrocities of the "Black" rebellion in Jamaica more befits the condition of the negro in his wild state in Africa than one would suppose could ue possible to be committed by blacks that claim to be free and civilized. The Colonial Standard of the 20th ult., says that after the negroes had taken possession of St. Thomas, the volunteers being overpowered, took refuge in the Court House, where the Custos, the Magistracy, Clergy and other gentlemen were. Finding that these parties had taken shelter, they smashed the windows to atoms, firing continually into the Court House, when the volunteers returned their fire, doing good service.

About half-past five o'clock the Court House was fired. The Custos then put out a flag of truce by advice of the Clerk of the Peace. The rioters asked what it meant, and were answered peace! They said they did not want peace, they wanted war. A second flag of truce was put out, with no better effect, the rebels cried out, war! war! On the roof of the Court House falling in, through the fire that had been set to the premises, the Custos and other gentlemen burst open the doors and ran down the steps; the rebels attacked them in every direction. The Custos were butchered in the most frightful manner; the fingers of his right hand were jointed, the rebels saying that was the d-d hand that wrote the Queen against us. They publicly stated during the day that the Custos and Magistrates had written the Queen lies against them, and that they would show the Queen that day what the negro could do when oppressed and lies told upon them : that Mr. Gordon had informed Paul Bogle when the Vestry was to be held, and that the Custos would be present. They dug out the eyes of almost every one they murdered; they cut the tongue out of the Rev. Mr. Victor Herschell, cut his throat and partially skinned him; the also murdered a black gentleman, Mr. Price, in cold blood, in the most barbarous and brutal manner, and then ripped open his bowels.
