DATES TO DECEMBER 9.

Chicago, Dec. 8.—Gayle, the assassin who has not appeared for trial before Judge Bassett at Montgomery, Alabama, and gave bonds to appear when called for.

New York, Dec. 3.—O'Farrell, President of the Fenian Brotherhood, publishes a circular denouncing the malcontents styling themselves the Fenian Senate, now in session.

Senor Osuna, special envoy from Chile, gave a sumptuous banquet at Delmonico's on Wednesday night.

G. A. Keppler will leave for Chile December 21, under instructions.

Chicago, Dec. 8.—A fire broke out this morning at the corner of Clark and Jackson streets, and destroyed five buildings occupied by twenty families. Loss \$50,000. It was caused by incendiaryism. A fire broke out in Margraves, Ia., this morning, and destroyed 200 buildings, comprising stores and other valuable structures with their contents. Losses \$100,000.

The resignations of Generals Butler and Dix have been accepted. The former intends to reply to that part of the report of Grant which was sent to Congress.

Louisville, Dec. 8.—The trial of Gen. Palmer began in the Circuit Court on three indictments for enticing slaves to leave their owners. The General opened the case for himself in a brief, fair and eloquent statement. He said he had acted in obedience to orders and not with a view to violate the statutes of Kentucky. A motion to dismiss the indictment was heard and submitted.

Halifax, Dec. 8.—The steamship *Ara* has arrived with Liverpool dates to Nov. 26th.

The Paris correspondent of the London *Globe* says that the Spanish Ministry has decided to back out of the Chilean affair, and the Spanish Admiral has been ordered to suspend operations.

Chicago, Dec. 8.—Washington dispatches say that a Cabinet meeting decided that Major, the rebel Secretary of the Navy should be tried by jury at once.

Gen. Logan had an interview with the Secretary of State, but has not yet accepted the Mexican Mission. Reasons given were introduced in Congress on Wednesday, which have been incorrectly interpreted as having reference to employees of the Treasury Department; but they are directed against a certain class of officers who could not take the prescribed oath. Provisional Governors included.

El Paso advices, of Nov. 9th, include a decree from Jimenez extending the Presidential term, because a popular election is impracticable. Another decree declares Ortega subject to trial upon his return for staying in the United States.

The Indian tribes that made the recent attack on the Overland Route are believed to be the branch of the Cheyennes and Arapahoes which were driven forth to the Platte river, after the Cheyenne massacre last August. When the commissioners were on the plains they were informed that these Indians had sent messengers to negotiate for peace. It is supposed that these messengers were attacked and driven back by our forces, and robbed of their mission, and that the recent attacks are in retaliation. Information has been received at the Department of the Interior that shows that these Indians are yet disposed to be friendly, and Major Wynkoop has been detailed to negotiate with them.

Since last March seventy-eight Brig.-Generals have been mustered out of service; twenty-two Major Generals and fifty-four Brig. Generals have resigned.

Daniel S. Dickinson and F. Spinner are now the most prominent candidates for the N. Y. Collectorship.

In regard to the rebel loan it said that doubts have been expressed as to the authenticity of the list previously published. A more complete list is given of the bond holders on the rebel books at the payment of the last interest about Nov. 6th. This list shows whether that payment of interest was made or not by each individual. The bills vary in amount from \$250 to \$1,000. It is reported that about \$800,000 in excess of the \$3,000,000, was surreptitiously placed on the London market by the rebels. It will be represented by the London papers that others were subscribers to the loan. Their denial may be accounted for by the fact that as the list shows they did not receive the last payment of interest, or their names may have been intended to secure their influence without calling upon them for subscriptions.

It is reported in Mobile that Jacob Lawrence and G. W. Dusden, late of the Treasury Department as common agents, have pocketed a million dollars each, and left the country to escape prosecution and punishment.

New York, Dec. 8.—Wall street is very dull. The only feature of importance is the increased public confidence as indicated by the rise in gold securities and the decline of gold. This improvement is attributable in part to the satisfactory tone of the President's message, and to the decided policy of the Secretary of the Treasury relative to contraction, and to the prospect of the reduction in the war and navy departments, and in the aggregate of the annual debt.
