TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Congressional.

In the House, Dec. 20.-Stevens, of Pennsylvania, made a speech on reconstruction, arguing that the lately rebellious states must come back into the Union as new States, or remain as conquered provinces. The whole subject was in the hands of Congress.

Senate.-The Commercial's Washing ton dispatch says the e are indications that Congress will revoke the City Charter of Washington, to make the District of Columbia a Territory, with a delegate in the House.

Mr. Wilson called up the Senate bill to maintain the freedom of the inhabitants of the States lately in rebellion.

Mr. Sumper addressed the Senate in favor of the bill. When he thought of what occurred in this chamber yesterday, in heated temper, to white-wash the unhappy condition of the rebel States, he felt that they ought to speak of nothing else to-day. He proceeded to speak of the right of Congress to pass the bill and read letters from the Southern States; private and public, to show that the spirit of the rebellion still exists there, and the rights of the freedmen were being disregarded in all the Southern States.

Morrill, of the Committee of Ways and Means, reported a bill authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to ap-

point Assistant Assessors of Internal Revenue. Passed. Stevens, of Pennsylvania, intro-duced a bill to pay pensions and damages done to Union property by rebels, out of confiscated property. Referred to Committee of the Whole.

Lawrence, of Ohio, submitted a resolution, which was laid on the table, affirming that Jeff. Davis should be tried and punished for treason, and also, on account of the starving of prisoners.

Banks reported an amendment to the rules, recognizing as officers of the House the reporters of the Globe. A debate ensued, and the subject was sent to the Judiciary Committee to enquire whether there was any existing contract between the House and the publishers of the Globe, it having been contended that such an arrangement interfered with private rights.

The House concurred in the conference which reported to adjourn over the holidays, from to-morrow till the 5th of January.

THE OLDEST WOMAN IN NEW ENG-LAND .- There is now living at Harvard probably the oldest person in New England of whose birth and age there is authentic record. This is Mrs. Rebecca Huse, who was born in Groton, in 1750—106 years ago—according to the record of the first parish of that town, where the original entry of her birth at that date may be seen. She has always resided in the immediate vicinity of her birthplace, removing from Groton, at the age of 15; to the adjoining town of Harvard and into the house she still occupies. Her husband has long since deceased, and of a large family of children there is but a single daughter living, herself a venerable lady, with whom she makes her home. The father of Mrs. Huse served as a soldier in the old Revolution, and an uncle was killed in one of the early battles of that struggle. This venerable relic of a bygone age still retains to a remarkable degree of perfection her sense of sight and hearing, being but slightly deaf, and is remark. ably active, making her own fire in the morning and attending through the day to a large part of her house-hold duties. Till the present year she has kept and cared for a cow and attended to some gardening. She receives her many visitors with gentle courtesy, and appears to delight in recalling for their benefit or pleasure scenes and incidents of her well remembered experience of a full cen-


