MOUNT HOOD IN A STATE OF ERUPTION AGAIN. From early in the morning, yesterday, until night dense volumes of smoke were seen rising from the south-east side of Mount Hood, near the summit. The smoke clouds drifted to the west and hung around the crest of the peak, or floated off into the cañon of Hood River. If the amount of smoke is the criterion by which to judge the degree of activity prevailing in the subterranean furnace of the mountain, then the concealed volcanic agencies are very much stirred up about this time. It is not impossible that we shall yet be treated to the sublime spectacle of a Chimborazo-like eruption, with accompanying earthquakes—rivers of lava—thundering explosions and such like concomitants of a live volcano on a big scale. It may yet happen that a torrent of lava, like that which ran from Mauna Loa some years since, will pitch off into the Columbia River and impede navigation at some point between here and the Cascades. If this should occur, there will doubtless be some far-seeing town-site speculator, with sufficient presence of mind, to at once claim the first quarter section below the obstruction. There are several other contingent speculations upon the occurrence of a new break in the navigation of the river; among which, a railroad around the new impediment, or a canal, are the most important.

SHOOTING AFFAIR.—A shooting match occurred yesterday afternoon at the corner of Second and Washington streets. Two parties—names unknown and persons not identified—had a quarrel, and one wanted the other "to take it back, or bite the dust." One struck, or attempted to strike, the other with a whip, and then a pistol was drawn by somebody, and fired at something, without effect. Being in dread of arrest, both parties left the ground very suddenly. It would be well for the police to keep a good look out for persons of belligerent proclivities; not that it is particularly desirable to prevent the killing of any person or persons foolish enough to shoot at each other in the streets, but for fear some innocent and respectable person may be hurt by a random shot. To prevent the inauguration of the Montana code of criminal jurisprudence, we must avoid the institution of the Idaho and Arizona codes of honor, with the consequent pistol-practice.

P. S. At a late hour in the evening, a person by the name of Bybee was arrested, on the charge of being the one who fired the pistol.

FROM LEWISTON TO HELENA.—Gov. Lyon, in his message to the Idaho Legislature, speaks as follows:

It is left to your discretion whether it would not be well to memorialize Congress for an appropriation for the construction of a road from Lewiston, in Northern Idaho, to Helena, in the territory of Montana, via the Lolo Fork and Bitter Root Valley. From the rapidly increasing trade in that direction and the late important discoveries in the Blackfoot country of the precious metals, as well as the difficulties attendant upon the navigation of the headwaters of the Missouri River, this route is the nearest now known between the two points named. Ladened pack-roads have made the trip in less than twelve days.

The Governor is mistaken in this matter. It is 220 miles from Lewiston to Bitter Root Valley; 80 more of a very rough trail to the mouth of Little Blackfoot, and 50 more from thence to Helena—total, 350 miles. Of this distance, the first section is utterly impassable to loaded animals, and no loaded train has ever crossed it since 1861, and that was fifteen days, light-packed, to Bitter Root Valley.

POPULATION WANTED.—An increase of laboring population is required in the Boise and Owyhee mines. As a preliminary to the complete and permanent population of Idaho, we again urge upon the governor the scheme we proposed some time since, of appropriating the excess of the female population of Utah. There are eighty-six honest miners in Boise that have an inherent right in the surplusage of Brigham's matrimonial arrangements. The change can be made with advantage to all, particularly the fair Mormonses.
