Epitome of Telegraphic News.

DATES TO JANUARY 3.

New York, Jan. 2.—A Washington dispatch says: An examination of the records of the records of the Attorney General's office, proves that no application for pardon has yet been filed by Gen. Lee. All the manifestations of contrition exhibited by Lee has been the signing of the amnesty oath prior to entering upon the duties of President of Washington College.

New York, Jan. 1.—A Washington dispatch says: A secret letter of Yulee, of Florida, giving an account of the plot and plan of secession, written some time before the first act of the rebellion took place, has been placed in the hands of the Government to be used as part of the evidence in the trial of Jeff. Davis.

Washington, Jan. 1.—Notwithstanding the disagreeable condition of the weather, the first New Year's reception of President Johnson was largely attended. At 11 a. m., the doors of the Executive Mansion were open to Foreign Ministers and attaches. Sir Frederick Bruce was the first to arrive of the diplomatic corps, which was fully appreciated. The greeting appeared to be mutually happy and peculiar, and, in fact, there is nothing in the condition of our foreign relations to threaten the disturbance of the general peace. All the members of the Cabinet, Justices of the Supreme Court, and other prominent civil officers, with Senators and Representatives, also paid the usual annual visit at 11:30 a. m. The officers of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps, were similarly received. All were in uniform, Gen. Grant and staff being conspicuous among the group around the President. After the general reception all the colored persons on the premises, were admitted to pay their respects to the President.

New York, Jan. 2.—Gen. Sweeney has issued an appeal to the Fenians not to waste their energies in intestine strife. Let deeds, not words, be your motto. Strike before it is too late and the golden opportunity lost forever. Our situation is that of two armies whose chiefs cannot agree upon a line of operations. The vast extent of the British dominions offers many vital points, and as we cannot reconcile our views, let each army follow its chosen leader and attack where his judgment tells him are the best chances of success. Let this disgraceful squabble cease at once. On the field of battle we will forget all our personal rancor and factional prejudices to remember only our dear country and her wrongs. The General says: I can see but one way of escape. It is to call in each State convention delegates from different circles to decide in whom they will repose confidence. Then leave O'Mahoney and myself each to work out his respective plan for the liberation of Ireland. The Fenian Congress assembled to-day. A guard from the 99th regiment refused admission to all not furnished with credentials. The State Center, Rogers, of Manhattan District, called the body to order. Maj. Kelly was appointed chairman. A resolution sustaining O'Mahoney was adopted. The Congress then proceeded to the transaction of business, the nature of which has not transpired. There were two plenipotentiaries from Ireland present. It is stated they had letters from Stevens who is in France. Previous to the opening of Congress, Sweeny, Sinnott and Muller, of the Fenian Senate, met at Senate headquarters, and in pursuance of a regular adjourned meeting, held November 8th, but there being no quorum present they adjourned. Report says that two English detectives were spotted and refused admission to the Congress.

New York, Dec. 29.—The Evening Post's Washington dispatch says that the President is so thoroughly satisfied with the condition of the South and the peaceable state of our foreign relations, that he has determined to make still further reduction in the army.

The Post's Washington special says that a rumor is in circulation that the Governments of France and the United States have arrived at a definite understanding in relation to the affairs of Mexico, and the United States Government engages to prevent any interference with the Arch-Duke while he remains in that country, by the citizens of the United States, or other persons on the American soil. According to this arrangement, Maximilian is to be left to the protection of his Austrian body-guard, and the Mexican people are to be left to make such headway as they can. The correspondent adds that these rumors are not authenticated, but there is a general belief in their truth.

Washington, Dec. 29.—The question of negro suffrage was submitted to a vote of the people of the people of Georgetown. There were 1,700 votes polled, of which only one was in favor of extending the franchise to the negro. Captain Semmes has arrived here and is a prisoner at the Navy Yard.

California News.
San Francisco, Jan. 3.—The National Insurance Company has just been incorporated in this city with a capital of \$1,000,000, to be invested in U. S. Bonds as security. These

bonds are to be placed in a fire-proof vault for safe keeping. The business is to be conducted on a coin basis exclusively, the bonds being merely held as a security.

Ireka, Jan 4.—John Wifenbach, an old and wealthy citizen of this county, living about one mile from town, committed suicide this morning by blowing the top of his head off with a shot gun loaded with revolver balls. His wife was found in bed dead, having been shot through the head with a revolver. Wifenbach sent one of his children to a neighbor's in the morning with a book in which he had written that his wife had killed herself. The child stated that its mother was dead, and father had gone in the room to get the shot gun and kill himself. It appears that three shots had been fired from the pistol at his wife, only one of which had taken effect, the other two passing through the side of the house above her. The evidence before the corner's jury went to establish the fact that the man had killed his wife and then blew his own brains out. Wifenbach was partially insane.
