THE QUARTZ INTERESTS AT AUGUSTA, EAGLE CREEK MINES.—For two years past the continued discovery of valuable gold-bearing quartzes in the mining district located on the mountains bordering the west side of Eagle Creek, now called the Augusta District, has given confidence in the ultimate prosperity of that section.

The first discovery of importance was the Eagle Creek Lode, which was discovered by Knight, Wills and Rockfellow. This lode appears to furnish, to a limited amount, placer mining ground, a large quantity of free gold; but except in gulches heading into this lode, and parallel ranges of quartz, no placers of importance have been found.

Thousands of tons of quartz, taken from the average Eagle Creek Lode, and worked at the little Mill, on Powder River, yielded an average of \$35. The gold frequently forms free in the veins of extraordinary richness, and of great quantity. Some specimens have been brought to this place by Capt. L. Coffin, who has considerable interests in these mines, which for years have been unexplored. A five-stamp mill has been erected near Augusta, by Messrs. Simpson, Meacham and others, to work the quartz from the Eagle Creek Lode, and a vein, which is probably one of its side ranges, will go into active operation in the near future.

The quartz of the Eagle Creek country in its vicinity only needs to be better explored to enlist a large proportion of the capital seeking mining investments. There is no section which is more accessible, and more distant to the Columbia River, by a good road, is only one hundred and thirty miles. But it has heretofore been overlooked, and account of being remote from the great markets of the interior, and because it has been overshadowed by the prospects of rich pretentious, but not richer, localities.
