Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

DATES TO JANUARY 4.

Washington, Jan. 4.—The statements in relation to Pomeroy's (Mexican minister) visit to the executive mansion on the 1st of January are contradicted.

Senator Trumbull will submit two important bills to the Senate to-morrow. One of them is to enlarge the Freedmen's Bureau, and the other is to protect all persons in the United States in their civil rights, and furnish means for their vindication.

The following is an exhibit of the business of the Pension Department for the year just expired: Number of applications, admitted from invalid soldiers, 18,300; number of same rejected, 49,752; applications admitted from widows, mothers and orphans, 21,952; same rejected, 35,000; cases still waiting to be disposed of, 87,000, of which 31,165 are from mothers and orphans. During the last month of the year 32,070 letters and circulars relating to cases on file in the office have been mailed to parties interested or to their attorneys.

Kansas City, Jan. 3.—Advices by the Santa Fe coach say that intense cold weather prevailed on the plains. Snow bound trains lost nearly all their animals. Several teamsters were severely frozen, some fatally. Eleven men were picked up along the route in a helpless condition and taken to Fort Dodge for treatment.

New York, Jan. 4.—The Times' Washington special says: The resignations of Gen. Kilpatrick as Minister to Chile, Cox, Governor of Ohio, and Daves, Public Administrator of New York, have been accepted. The rendezvous for returned soldiers in Connecticut, Rhode Island and New Hampshire are broken up and all those four States are mustered out. Four companies of the Fifth U. S. Cavalry, serving at Cumberland, Md., are ordered to North Carolina for duty.

St. Louis, Jan. 3.—Gov. Fletcher took possession to-day of the St. Joseph and Atchison and Atchison and Western Railroads in consequence of the default of payment to the State of \$300,000 and interest, according to a law of the Missouri Legislature passed last winter, under which the roads were sold to Messrs. Stringfellow, Osborne, Carpenter and Burns. The Governor appointed State agents to operate the road until they can be sold again according to law.

New York, Jan. 4.—Via Havana we have news of another revolution in St. Domingo. Another earthquake shock was felt at Porto Rico at midnight on the 16th ult. No serious damage.

Some official news from the city of Chihuahua to the 24th of November is received.

Juarez and his Cabinet, Ministers and Supreme Court, and other functionaries arrived in Chihuahua, the Capitol of the Mexican Republic, on the 20th ult., and met with a warm and enthusiastic reception and quite a popular ovation.

The Minister of the Interior issued on the 21st of November a circular to the Governors of States, informing them that the National Government will be in Chihuahua for the present.

The people are rejoiced at having got rid of the French troops. News from the interior is represented as encouraging for the Nationalists.

Gen. Gaeta is President of the Republic, having accepted a military position under the Government. New York, Jan. 4.—Advices from Hayti to the 24th confirm the news of the bombardment of Cape Haytien and the rout of the rebels. The place was seriously damaged. Foreign residents took refuge on board of the American vessel of war. A number of prominent rebels were found in the house of the British Consul and captured.

Maximilian sent the Empress of France a medal of merit in recognition of her example in visiting the cholera hospitals.

At a religious ceremony held at Guadalupe Hidalgo on the 12th, 5,000 persons were present, mostly Indians.

The Imperials claim another victory over the Republican forces near Coniti, in which the famous leader Gomez Sanchez was killed. Maximilian has appointed Don Luis Lareaga Assistant Secretary of Foreign Affairs, and Don Manuel B. Cortez Executive Superintendent of the introduction into Mexico of Coolie laborers.

Gen. Quintana's private secretary was assassinated on the 27th of November, on one of the highways, by his military escort with the object of plunder.

The Republicans had taken possession of the town of La Paz, in Lower California. Eight hundred French troops whose terms of service had expired were to leave Vera Cruz on the 24th. An arrival there of others from France was daily looked for.

It is reported that Maximilian's Minister of Foreign Affairs, Romdoral, stated the only hope of the Imperial Government rested on the success of the loan in the London market. Mexican advices say that Gen. Mendezaval gives his adhesion to the Imperial cause.
