

ANOTHER PEACE DISCOURSE BY MR. BEECHER—At the anniversary of the American Missionary Association, in his church, at Brooklyn, Henry Ward Beecher made some further remarks in support of President Johnson and his policy of conciliation. The chief points are thus outlined:—

Emancipation is a process, and we must not expect it to be accomplished to-day or to-morrow. It took forty years when God led his people to bring them from Egypt to the promised land, and if we bring these freedmen in ten, don't you think we shall be doing pretty well? Old habits are to be shaken off, slavish tendencies swept away, prejudices dissipated; and we shall find that this work cannot be done rapidly. It will take not only judgment and wisdom, but hope. I make up my mind beforehand to sickness, sorrow and suffering; but if in five years we get these people on their feet with three quarters of those that are now alive remaining, we shall have done a glorious work. It is the future all the time, not the present; it is the joy set before us that must be looked at.

It is folly to suppose that we can persuade Andrew Johnson to take our view of the exercise of his power by bombarding and browbeating him; and still less can a course of reckless and carping remarks incline the legislatures of southern states to grant to the colored population around them the full exercise of their civil rights. It is hard to revolutionize man's prejudices or change his opinions. How long since blacks have been allowed to sit in churches at the North; and even now there is scarcely one to be found in every fifth church; or to ride in cars or in omnibuses? And can we preserve this caste and still be indignant because the southerners do not instantly lift the negroes to a level with themselves? We ask the South to rise fifty degrees in the scale, while we fail to rise one! We should maintain our hold upon the national government, cultivate the apostle's injunction of 'speaking the truth in love,' (Mem: For the benefit of the New York Independent) and have a care lest it be said that the worst men in the North are the best friends of the South.

HASTEN THE FACILITIES.—We now get newspapers from Chicago and St. Louis in less time than from Boise and points on the upper Columbia. The proposed mail route between here and Lewiston and Walla Walla cannot be put in operation too soon. There are several thousand now in the Territory whose business and private correspondence is confined to the West. It generally requires six weeks, in the round-about way the mails now go, to send a letter to Portland and receive an answer thereto. Besides, there are several populous and growing settlements beyond Blackfoot, whose business relations are exclusively confined to points to the eastward; who have no mail facilities whatever. A letter is often received in Virginia from Hell Gate a week or two weeks after its date when ordinary mail time would bring the two points within two days of each other. Montana Post.

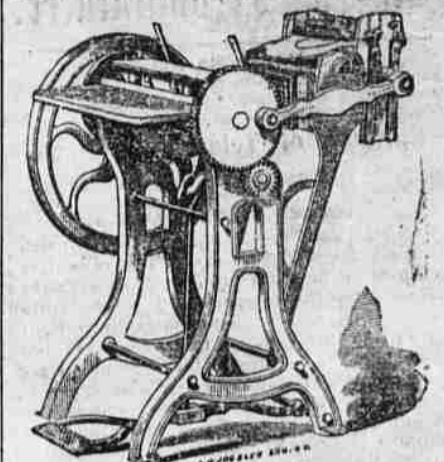
