**THE BASIS OF QUALIFIED VOTERS.**—The proposition to elect the President and Vice-President of the United States by a plurality of voters, and to distribute the Congressional representation on the basis of qualified voters will prove a tempting lure to the Southern States to enfranchise the black race. By so doing, the weight of the late slave holding states will be increased forty per cent in a presidential election, and it will add something over thirty members to their aggregate Congressional representation. Since the abolition of slavery, there is no representation for the colored people, and if the Southern States can see any prospect of keeping them in their interest, they may be willing to sacrifice their prejudices on the altar of expediency. The theory of representation by voters is one that affects the relative positions of the North and South more seriously than that would appear upon a cursory examination. On this coast it will probably prove a most popular measure, as it will increase the representation in Congress; and fit such communities as Idaho and Montana, at once, to take upon themselves the mantle of state hood. It is a noticeable fact that prominent rebels, like Reagan of Texas and H. S. Foote, appear to be coalescing with the radicals to effect this innovation on the Constitution.

Cousins, Cottos, &c.—It seems very silly to see specific medicines for the cure of pulmonary complaints advertised in this country, where the only consumption to be dreaded is the extraordinary consumption of grub and ardent spirits, and the only "coughing" that anybody needs to fear is the coffin in which he or she is to be buried. An advertisement headed "Hang by the heavens with black," would naturally lead outsiders to think that the whole country up here was going into mourning for the deceased victims of consumption. Another gravely states that "when the lungs have once been destroyed, they can never be made sound again," and hence, after the lungs have been destroyed, use Prigrick's Pulmonary Preparation. The pain-killer class of curatives is advertised by a hideous picture of "My wife as she looked after falling into the fire and burning her right ear and her nose off;" and again "as she looked after drinking two bottles of Perry's Pain Panacea, and applying one quart of it to the parts afflicted." It ought to be known to the outside world, that in the matter of pulmonary complaints, the people of Oregon and the Columbia interior are less afflicted in that way than in any other portion of the United States; that the average state of health can only be expressed by the word "hang," and that the sale of detestable compounds for the cure of such diseases, in nine cases out of ten, arises from an artificial *lure*, created by a miserable system of advertising. If the sale of liquor can be restricted, the reading of such medicines certainly ought to be.

THE Indoors say that in the most remote antiquity, of which they have any tradition, men lived to be from sixty thousand to eighty thousand years old. If this be true, Methusaleh died prematurely at nine hundred and sixty-nine, and Old Parr was only a baby at one hundred and twenty-three.
