

EMIGRATION TO TENNESSEE.— A Nashville letter says: "There is a considerable tide of emigration already setting into this State. So far, it is principally composed of business and professional men, who are locating in the towns and cities of the State. Emigration to Nashville has pretty well reached its limit, until our accommodations in the way of houses are increased. Hundreds of applicants during the last month have been unable to obtain any sort of shelter, and consequently have been compelled to seek a location elsewhere. In consequence of the great demand for houses in the city, rents have reached a fabulous figure, and continue to advance. We gladly receive any addition to our population, by those who will become worthy members of the community, whatever their business or profession, but what we most need is an influx of agriculturists and mechanics who will go into the country and country towns and develop the immense resources of the country. For such men the inducements which are now offered in many portions of the State are seldom surpassed. The labor and economy which would simply enable an Ohio farmer to live comfortably, would, in many portions of Tennessee, owing to our genial climate and generous soil, enable him in a short time to become independent. There are but few portions of the State at this time where emigrants would have any cause for serious apprehension on account of the disturbances of the country. We would like to have 50,000 sturdy German farmers during the ensuing year.

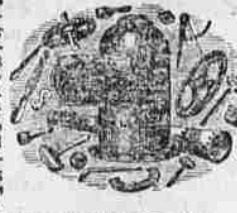

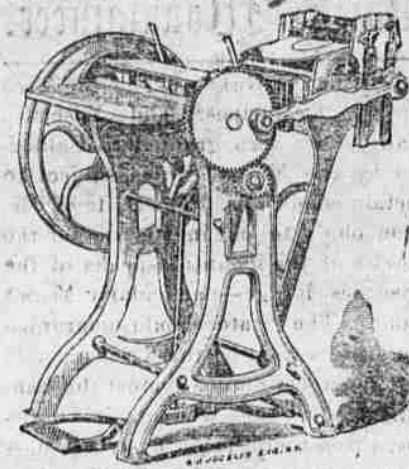
