

IMPARTIAL SUFFRAGE.—While we are so anxious to establish Manhood Suffrage, we should not forget that a large portion of the inhabitants of this country are disfranchised by cruel, tyrannical laws. In this we do not refer to our colored brethren, but to the descendants of the aborigines of the Columbia Basin. The difference between our relations to the descendants of Ham and these people is, that the first were torn from their country, despoiled of property and liberty, for the advantage of the barbarous whites; while the whites came among the Indians, at their houses and camps, stole their horses and daughters, shot their young bucks, murdered their old men, occupied their lands and made themselves "at home," in general way, and behaved pretty much as they pleased whenever they had the upper hand. Equal and exact justice requires that, if the colored men of the south are to be enfranchised, the Indians ought also to be allowed to vote. If it is necessary that voters shall know how to read the Constitution of the United States, this difficulty may be easily overcome by translating that instrument into the Chinook Jargon. For the extension of like facilities to our colored brethren of the south, we shall feel inclined to advocate the translation of the same into pure Ashantee and dialects in common use on the Guinea coast. A phonetic arrangement of the Constitution, on the basis of the ordinary negro-pronunciation of English at the south, will also be useful in bringing the right of suffrage within easy reach of the colored folks and many illiterate whites. But above all, we demand the electoral right for the Indians; excepting the rebellious Snakes. These, however, by taking an oath of allegiance, and swearing not to "bush-whack" or go out "guerrillaing" any more, may avail themselves of the benefit of the law for the extension of the right of suffrage. The bearing of this movement on the politics of the State is obvious. By having the Indian vote principally in the Columbia Basin, we will be enabled to bring the inhabitants of the Great Willamette to our own terms, whenever they have the audacity to entertain ideas inimical to our interests, or disagreeable to our sensibilities.

INGRATITUDE OF THE BASIST KIND.—Day before yesterday, Parker, of Bloch, Miller & Co., hired a man named Charles Kerry to throw the snow off of the building occupied by the above mentioned firm as a store. The man worked so diligently that Parker, in the fulness of his benevolence, three several times climbed to the top of the house with glasses of whisky to comfort Kerry in his arduous task, and at length, being tired of his frequent ascents to the roof, gave the man liberty to come down stairs and help himself to the ardent at pleasure. Taking advantage of this, Kerry went into a room in the rear of the store, occupied as a sleeping apartment, and abstracted divers pairs of pantaloons, pocket handkerchiefs and other unconsidered trifles. Being paid for his services, and his depredations not having, as yet, been discovered, he hung around the neighborhood until evening, when he was discovered in the act of stealing a bundle of shirts. As everybody knows, P. is a mild-mannered man; but this specimen of ingratitude quite upset his equanimity, so he ordered the fellow to drop the shirts and then kicked him into the street. Some time afterwards the discovery was made that the articles afore-mentioned had been stolen, and Kerry was at once hunted up and committed to jail. Afterwards he was on the street, ornamented with a ball and chain, doing the city some service by shoveling snow from the sidewalks and crossings. There are six or seven men of Kerry's stamp now running loose about this place. For the lack of an ordinance to punish petty larceny these men go unwhipped of justice; as the expense of a State prosecution to a conviction is so considerable that the law is practically inoperative, unless prisoners can be made to labor. This can be effected by inaugurating the chain-gang system of punishment. The power is with the City Council to inaugurate an institution of this character at once. Several promising candidates for positions in it can at once be obtained.
