THE CHICO ROUTE AGAIN.—The Owyhee Avalanche, the Idaho representative of the California interest, and the Chico route in particular, in its issue of the 16th of December, thus summarizes the disadvantages of the Columbia River route to the Idaho mines:

The distance from Chicago to where any machinery has been unloaded in Idaho, is at least twenty-five hundred miles; and the distance from San Francisco, overland, to the nearest quartz-mines of this Territory, is not six hundred miles, while the distance via Portland is twelve hundred. There is no farther overland travel direct from San Francisco, than via Portland; and the former is much the best road. But so long as people having freight to ship from San Francisco to Idaho, bring it via the Columbia River, subject to the many handlings by the extortionists of that portage-infested thoroughfare, just so long will it be cheaper to freight from Chicago—or the eastern end of Newfoundland—overland. First—six hundred miles of ocean risks to the Bar of the Columbia; passengers hold prayer-meeting while the freight is lightered over the Bar; 120 miles to Portland, with additional lighterage to your freight bill, as per Swan Is and Bar in the Willamette—a regular thing; pay tribute to Portlanders, be put on a river steamer and landed at the foot of the Cascades, fifty or sixty miles; be transferred for five miles of railroad; (splendid scenery and more portage added;) re-shipped again fifty or sixty miles to the Dalles; railroad portage for fifteen miles to Celilo; steambated again over one hundred miles, when the final dump in the sand takes place at Umatilla; bull or mule team it forty or fifty miles to the foot of the Blue Mountains, and then double or treble team it the same distance over one of the highest ranges on the Coast; from two to three hundred miles further of varied streams, mountains, sagebrush, sand, tolls and ferriage, etc., and the freight, of whatever species it may be, is in big luck if it gets to Idaho at all.

A LUCKY SPECULATOR.—A striking instance of the uncertainty of mining recently occurred at Whroo, in the Rushworth district, Australia. A poor miner who had been working in alluvial ground for a long time, and was barely earning a livelihood, accidentally came on a reef with gold-bearing indications. He was so destitute of means that he was unable to raise £1 for a miner's right to secure his title to the claim, and he solicited several persons, to whom he related his discovery, for the money, at the same time offering a half share in the claim for the advance. He was met with a refusal by all except one, who gave the money as a hazardous speculation, but was amply repaid by the first crushing, which gave a dividend of nearly £500 to each man.

CLOSED AGAIN.—The Columbia, contrary to general expectation and the predictions of several hundred weather prophets, is again frozen up. All day on Sunday the river was covered with fields of ice; which, it was thought came from the breaking of the ice-barrier at Holl Gate, just above the mouth of Des Chutes. Towards midnight, the ice came down more crowded, and about two o'clock a. m., it ceased to move. Again, yesterday morning, it seemed about to break away, but towards night it was solidly packed across the river.
