

THE DULLNESS OF FURNISHING — In the first place, we would lay down as a fundamental principle in furnishing, that the end in view should be to make a house or a room cheerful, comfortable. We say livable, because there are so many which, though handsomely furnished, are dreary in the extreme, and the very thought of living in them makes one shudder. Others captivate us by their picturesque appearance, and we are inclined toward them; but one moment's peep inside dispels every wish of the kind. They are so dismal, the rooms are low, dark and small, and an atmosphere of darkness pervades the whole.

The dull style of furnishing is, like every other form of dullness, very common. The prevailing tints drab, oak, and a dingy red. There is much neatness about it. The highly polished round-table stands universally in the middle of the room, with perhaps some wax flowers, generally water lilies under a glass shade—in the center; or it may be, a bit of needle work and beads for a lamp shade at night, and a tall, lank glass case for flowers by day. A few well bound books are placed upon the table at equal distances, all radiating from the center; carpet is a flowery pattern on a red ground, which is also red with stripes of brown and drab. The sofa and arm chairs have the same dull cover. One never goes into the room without feeling inclined to yawn; and a sense of depression comes over one after a few minutes. It is essentially dull and drab—respectable certainly, but painfully dull.—London Society

The number of men called for by the Government during the war was 2,759,049, and the actual number contributed by all the States and Territories was 2,656,553. The number of colored troops enlisted was 178,975. It is computed by the War Department that 325,000 Union soldiers lost their lives in the war, and 200,000 rebels. The losses among the colored troops were 68,178. Something over a million cases were treated in the military hospitals, with the average mortality of eight per cent. The captures of prisoners from the rebels were near 400,000, which is probably one-half of all arms-bearing class at the South who really favored secession.

Spurious twenty-dollar greenbacks, well executed and calculated to pass readily, are in circulation. The green ink is rather pale, but otherwise they are almost fac-similes of the genuine note, in every respect but one. The figure of Liberty in the centre of the face is faint in the counterfeit and is badly engraved, the drapery being especially coarse. These bills are so well done that even bank-tellers and brokers have been deceived by them.

Upon her last trip the steamer *Facific* refused to take the passengers from Victoria, who held tickets for the *Sierra Nevada*. All such persons were compelled to wait until the latter vessel went to sea. This arrangement excites much unfavorable comment from the press and public at the Emporium.

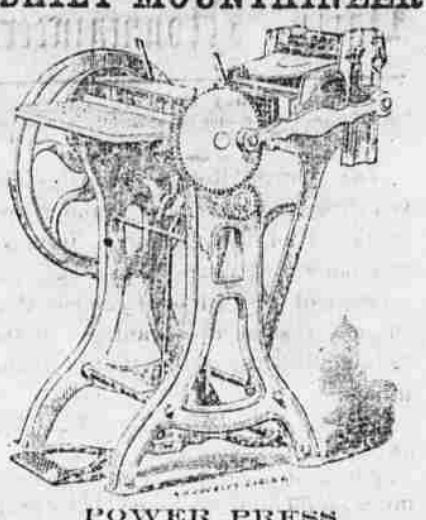
