It is her plaything—about the only one necessity allows her. In this way the girls of a court in St. Giles have the advantage over girls of the court of St. James, inasmuch as they play as mothers with real children. If we wished to be sentimental we might say that babies are the dolls of the daughters of poverty.

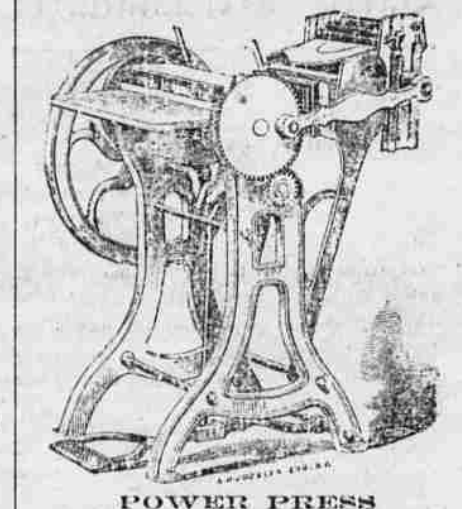
