SOMETHING ABOUT AN UNKNOWN NEGRO.—Near the head of that branch of the Cour d'Alene River which the Mullau Roanase calls "order" to attain to the summit of the Bitter Root Range, there is a little strip of prairie some distance off of the road in the midst of the dense forest of Spanish cedar and spruce, which extends along the upper section of the river. It is a singularly lonely place, and for some twenty miles either way from it, there is no place where enough grass can be found to feed a dozen horses. It was into this place, on the evening of the 2d of July, 1865, that a party of disappointed Cour d'Alene prospectors, toiled off of the main road to camp. Passing along a trail, where the dense underbrush lay across it, the foremost rider of the party was started, on emerging into the prairie-ground, to see an old negro man lying dead on the ground. An examination showed that he had been shot through the heart, the bullet going under the shoulder blade and coming out of his breast. The party remained all night at the prairie, and humanely buried the man. At that time everybody was traveling towards Blackfoot, and if the murderer or murderers had gone on in that direction, it would be difficult to overtake them, and once in the mines, to trace them would cost more a double than anybody was likely to take for the sake of an old negro. The next day after the negro was buried, still another party of prospectors turned off to the little prairie to camp, and finding the grave, supposed that it might be a cache containing liquors, as in that vicinity there had been several hundred gallons of whiskey cached some years before by M. Han's sutler, of which a portion was never recovered. Nothing would seem more reasonable than that some of these liquors had been found and buried, and the shape of a grave given to the cache to keep travelers from digging it up. Such things are often done in the mountains. Not to be "played" in this way, one of the boys started to dig up the contents of the hole, and in a moment exposed the face of the poor old negro. He was a second time examined; the wounds were searched, and a saddle was found with blood on it; an old pair of saddle-bags was found in another place, with a spelling-book in it, and several other articles of no particular interest. The negro was buried again, and the articles taken to be used in identifying him. At the Bitter Root Ferry, fifty miles from here, information was obtained that the old negro and an Indian boy were traveling together from Hellegard's towards Walla Walla. The negro had some money and a wife. The Indian had neither arms nor money. The negro was a contumacious man who had come from Kentucky to Montana. He was old, harmless and stupid; yet he had bought a spelling book and was in pursuit of knowledge under difficulties. The negro's horse and rifle had been traded off by an Indian boy at the Cour d'Alene Mission, and had already got back to the Bitter Root River in the hands of a man who was bound for Blackfoot. It is very reasonable to suppose that in that little prairie, enclosed by the trees which reared their cone-shaped tops skyward, with no witness but the birds and the All-seeing Eye of God, this Indian boy treacherously slew the unsuspecting old black man, and appropriated his property. "Old Jake," for such was the negro's name, died a stranger in a strange land, and all that he ever said of his parentage, nativity and history was "Ise from Old Knucks, Massa." The balance is a blank; save that he fled from slavery, was stupid, bought a spelling book and was murdered. The place where he was slain is called "Nigger Prairie" now.

New Jersey.—In speaking of the late election New Jersey, an exchange says the Republicans got possession of New Jersey very opportunely. In the term of Governor Ward, which commenced January 18th, and continues three years, there are to be appointed four out of six Judges of the Court of Appeals, holding office six years, a Chancellor, presiding over the Court of Chancery, seven years, a Chief Justice and three associates out of six, and an Attorney General, each holding office seven years. Besides these, are the clerks, surrogates and sheriffs of the counties, sixty-three officers in all, who will be elected in 1867 for a term of five years. The Republicans will thus get control of the most important offices in the State.
