Two Perrys in the Field.—The San Francisco *Dramatic Chronicle* say that by a private letter from New York we learn that on the appearance of our California Mrs. H. A. Perry on the stage she received an intimation from the other Mrs. H. A. Perry, who claim to be the only true and original Mrs. H. A. Perry and uses her right to that title on the assertion that H. A. Perry was united to her in the holy bonds of wedlock before he left for California, to the effect that Miss Agnes Laird persisted in using the name of "Mrs. H. A. A number of persons arrived in this place from Umatilla yesterday, coming through in three days. Most of them come down to the ice-barrier, thirty miles below Umatilla, in a snow-storm, and from there make their way down overland. The impression exists among these travelers that the ice will not go out of the upper section of the river until there is a great rise of water. At the head of the barrier the water is backed up some thirty feet in perpendicular height, and there is some speculation upon the probable result of the ice suddenly breaking away, and the rush of this vast volume of water consequent upon it.

The Gold Hill News says that to run the tail of the Gould & Curry Company, it requires 3 cords of wood per day, and for the machinery of the company at the Bonner shaft, six cords, making 36 cords, or about 13,000 cords per year. It estimates the average cost to be \$15, making a consumption by this company of \$200,000 worth of fuel in each year. Upon this basis it estimates the quantity of fuel consumed by the mines and mills at 200,000 cords per annum, creating an expense of \$3,000,000.

A baby about four weeks old was found on a door-step in Waterport, Conn., recently. The following directions were found pinned to the child's clothing: "Give him cow's milk one-half water, and a teaspoonful of brandy to one gill of food." A bottle of brandy, a quantity of medicine, and a nail of sugar was left with this youngster in his first step in life.

The celebrated mechanical duck of Vauclusan is now being exhibited in the Rue de Paris, at Havre, in a small museum which takes its name from that illusion's mechanician. The bird, standing on a sort of box, shakes its wings, eats, drinks, and imitates nature so accurately that one day a dog flew at it, without, however, doing any mischief.

Grauga county, Ohio, is probably the greatest cheese emporium in the world. The Chardon *Democrat* says that the factory of Messrs. Bullock & Stokes, at that place, receives the milk of one thousand cows, and manufactures from it a ton of cheese per day.

For the week ending the 9th of December, 1865, \$1,500,000 of treasure was received at San Francisco. Over one million of this amount was from the "Northern Coast," which means from this part of the country.

The returned profits of the national banks for the quarter ending the first of October last, were, in the aggregate, \$31,000,000.


The damage to the Five Mile Creek bridge, by the late freshet, is thoroughly repaired.

In five minutes a barrel of powder can be made non-explosive, and in another five minutes it can be restored to its original condition. We have seen powder subjected to this process and stirred with a red hot poker without explosion. If a shell burst in a store filled with the prepared powder, it would not fire it. The process can be readily applied to large or small quantities, and it does not require any cumbersome apparatus. The invention will solve the serious difficulty which has been felt as to the storage of powder in time of peace, and in war it will avert the danger which arises from the necessity of fighting in the neighborhood of


