**AMMONIA AS A SUBSTITUTE FOR STEAM**—Quite an interest exists at present among the French engineers, growing out of the late discovery of the proposition for the employment of ammoniacal gas for propelling carriages, and a patent for an ammonia engine has been taken out in the United States. The gas is condensed by cold, and the liquid ammonia thus prepared is put in a reservoir, connected by a pipe and stopcock with a working cylinder. At the ordinary temperature of the atmosphere, the liquid expands into gas with great force, and when the cock is opened the gas rushes into the cylinder and works the piston in the same manner as steam. It is then condensed by water, for which it has a strong affinity. The quantity of liquid ammonia used in an hour as an equivalent to the power of one horse, does not exceed three gallons, weighing twenty-two pounds. The water used to absorb it is saved and the ammonia recovered and used over again. It has long been a favorite purpose of inventors to compress air so as to store up power in a form capable of easy transportation. This problem is solved by the application of liquid ammonia.

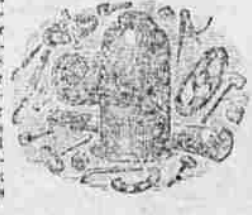

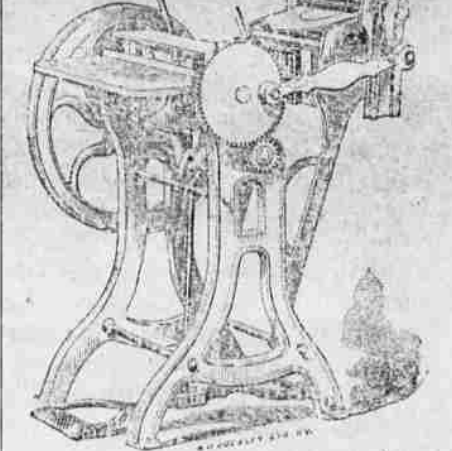
