DATES TO FEBRUARY 7.

New York, Feb. 7.—The following is a portion of Napoleon's speech to the Corps Legislatif on the 2d of January:

As I expressed the hope last year that our expedition to Mexico was approaching a termination, I am coming to understand with Maximilian to fix the epoch for the recall of our troops without compromising French interests which we have been defending in that remote country. The United States of North America, issuing victoriously from her late struggle, has re-established the Union of the states, and proclaimed slavery dead. France, which forgets no page of her history, offers up her sincere wishes for the prosperity of the American Republic, and for the maintenance of amicable relations which soon will have calmer direction. The emotion produced in the United States by the presence of our troops on Mexican soil, will be pacified by the frankness of our declarations. The American people will comprehend that our expedition to which we invite them was not opposed to their interests. Two nations, equal and jealous of their independence, ought to avoid every step which might affect their dignity and honor.

Washington, Feb. 5.—In the Senate, Wilson, of Massachusetts, presented the petition of Gen. Sheridan and other officers for an increase of pay. Referred.

Chandler, of Michigan, from the committee on commerce, reported the House bill to prevent the issue of American registers to vessels whose owners carried foreign registers during the war.

In the House, Blair, of Pennsylvania, introduced a bill, which was referred to the committee on reconstruction, providing for taking the census prior to the 1st of October next.

Briggs offered a resolution, which was adopted, instructing the committee on reconstruction to consider the subject of removing the National Capital in order that its site may be an accommodation to the population.

Washington, Feb. 5.—The Senate took up House resolution for amending the Constitution. Doolittle, of Wisconsin, offered the following substitute: "After the census to be taken in 1870, and each succeeding census, representation shall be apportioned among the several States within the United States, according to the number in each of men over twenty-one years of age, qualified by the laws thereof to choose members of the most numerous branch of the legislature, and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several States according to the real and personal taxable property situated in each State, not belonging to the State or the United States.

The following nominations were confirmed by the Senate: S. Garfield, of Washington Territory, Surveyor General for said Territory; John Wilson, of Peoria, Illinois, Consul at Antwerp; Nathaniel Spear, of Indiana, District Attorney, Florida; Fitz Henry Warren, of Iowa, Minister resident at Guatemala.

Washington, Feb. 7.—In the House, to-day, the following Senate bills were passed: extending the time for the completion of the Burlington and Missouri River Railroad from July to December; giving the franking privilege to Mrs. Lincoln during her life, and a joint resolution appropriating \$10,000 to pay the expense of the reconstruction committee.

San Francisco, Feb. 11.—Mr. Adams, Collector of Customs for the District of Oregon, who arrived by the steamer Oregon yesterday, was robbed of \$20,000. The detectives have found no clue whatever to the singular robbery.
