Cosmos S. M. Co.—The officers of this company, says the *Owyhee Avalanche*, arrived here the 1st of November. They had no mills selected; not an order out for lumber; not a man employed, and sangers to all. On the 6th of November the ground was broken for a mill foundation, and now it is nearly completed. The building is fully enclosed; batteries and stamps ready for crushing; the frame up, and gearing for the pans in position; the engine bolted fast through a stone bed of six feet, and the masonry for the boiler going up rapidly and well. This company's mine, the Silver Legion, is being worked night and day. The shaft is 5x9 and down 70 feet. At the surface, the quartz was gold-bearing, but each foot downward it approximates silver, and improves in richness. They have nearly 200 tons of pay rock ready to draw to the mill, and their road about finished to the mine. The company intend to sink the present shaft but little deeper, run side drifts and supply the mill from this mine. During the early part of the coming summer, hoisting works will be substituted for the wind-lass. One of Ericsson's improved hot air engines will be used, and has already been ordered from New York, and is expected to reach here in May. The old hot air engine proved a failure, but the improved one is a success. Mr. Masgrave, Superintendent of the Cosmos Company, has seen it work and knows what he is ordering. The engine works noiselessly, and one of eight horse power occupies a space of only five feet square, and can be placed in an ordinary shaft house, and weighs near one ton. Its economical character is its especial recommendation. No water is needed, and one-fourth of a cord of wood will supply one of eight-horse power twenty four hours. We have little doubt but two years from now War Eagle and Oro Fino mountains will be dotted all over with these machines.

The *Yreka Union* notes the fact that files of the *Mountaineer* from the 12th of December to the 23d of January were received at that office on the 1st of February. The delay until the 23d of January was doubtless due to the suspension of navigation, but the nine days from Portland to Yreka was plainly more time than is allowed by the terms of the contract for the daily mail.

THE LINCOLN MINE AND MILL.—The twenty-stamp mill of the Lincoln Mill Company, at Owyhee, is fast approaching completion.—Work on the company's mine, a fourth extension of the Oro Fino, is carried on night and day, and a considerable addition has been made to the working force of late.


THE KANSAS CITY JOURNAL OF COMMERCE announces that there is in contemplation in that city the starting of a stage and express company to carry freight and passengers and mails from that point to New Mexico, Arizona, Salt Lake and other places. The enterprise is in opposition to the Butterfield Stage and Express Company.
