Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE ORIGINAL.]

DATES TO FEBRUARY 17.

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 12.—Representative Donnelly telegraphs that Gen. Grant has decided to send out a military expedition next season to rebuild the military post in the State, and open a road from Minnesota to Montana.

Washington, Feb. 14.—In the Senate, Mr. Grimes presented the petition of Messrs. Cooper, Stoker, Maynard and others, representatives from Tennessee, setting forth the facts connected with the organization of that State, asking that the present State government be recognized.

The debate on the Constitutional Amendment being resumed, Mr. Clarke advocated the enfranchisement of the blacks. It could not for the present vote for the admission of a new State, except, perhaps, Tennessee.

In the House, the Speaker announced the select committee on the proposed Bureau of Education to be Messrs. Garfield, Patterson, Boutwell, Randall, Donnelly, Mouton and Goodyear.

A bill was introduced by Mr. Garfield to establish a National Bureau of Education, which provides for a commissioner to make an annual report exhibiting the condition of education in the States and Territories, and the diffusing of such information as may promote education throughout the country.

The House decided the Michigan contested election case in favor of Mr. Trowbridge, the sitting member, thus deciding that the soldier vote under the legislative authority, though the act was declared unconstitutional by the State Supreme Court, may be counted.

In the House, Holbrook, of Idaho, has introduced bills appropriating \$50,000 for public buildings at Boise City, to establish a land office at Boise City, to survey the boundary between Idaho and Oregon, and to establish a number of mail routes.

Washington, Feb. 17.—Gen. Robert E. Lee arrived to-day at the hotel. The Lexington, Virginia, Gazette says he has been summoned to appear before the reconstruction committee.

The sub-committee of the reconstruction committee, charged with the inquiry into Tennessee matters, have finished their labors and communicated with the main committee. The sub-committee examined many persons of the highest character and standing, including Gen. Thomas and Fisk, all of whom express the opinion that formal reconstruction would greatly strengthen the loyal sentiment in Tennessee, and for this reason concludes to submit to the main committee their report on the bill admitting Tennessee in the Union.

The bill is very like that usually framed for the admission of States. The sub-committee rest their recommendation on the ground that the rebellion has so thoroughly disturbed the relations of the seceded States in the Union as to require Congressional action for their restoration, and by the bill submitted they mean distinctly to assert and exercise the right of Congress to prescribe the mode of reconstruction.

The members elect from Tennessee in their petition for recognition, presented to the Senate by Mr. Grimes, day before yesterday, unmistakably acknowledge that they deem the formal re-admission by Congress necessary, and they are willing to accept the mode proposed by the sub-committee, thereby concurring with Congress and acting contrary to the President's views. Nearly all the members, in the main, are in favor of the admission of the Tennessee members in the manner prescribed by the committee. It is expected reports to that effect will be made to the Senate and House on Tuesday next.

A report was made to-day by Mr. Biane, of Maine, from the select committee on the debts due the loyal States by the Federal Government including data upon the subject, from all States except California, Oregon and Nevada.

The sum total of the debts as ascertained, is \$167,954,364. The committee recommend reimbursements in part on the basis furnished by each State.

Gen. Robt. E. Lee was before the reconstruction committee two hours to-day, and upon leaving the capitol walked to the Metropolitan Hotel, followed by a curious crowd which increased to a large assemblage by the time he reached his quarters.

Washington, Feb. 27.—The House to-day was devoted to speeches by Cook, Lawrence, Collum and others, all to the effect that the seceded States are out of the Union and Congress has the only power to reconstruct them.

Twenty-three Senators are counted upon to vote against the constitutional amendment fixing the basis of representation.

Chicago, Feb. 16.—The general impression at Washington among the newspaper press that the President will veto the Freedmen's Bureau bill, and the probable character of the veto causes much speculation.

EDWARD BATES, of Missouri, who was a member of Mr. Lincoln's cabinet, now acts with the democracy.
