New Method of making Shoer- - 4 hew style of shocs is now in lifis city The invention is simple. Tho upper part of the boot is cut out in almost ordinary fashion by a regular shoema ker. The solo and heel aro mado, of hard maplo wood, and are joined by a thank of solo leather, which gires all ioeded elaticity. The uppers are fas. tened to the sole by a thin band of iron, which eneircles the rim of the mole, and funtens sole and upper togeth. er in a manner more effoetual than any ewing can do. When put topether the shoe presents a handsome eppearance, and is as light as a leather shoe of corresponding sizo. The heels aro comfortably hollowed out on the upper side, and the soles have the proper arvo to insure easy walking. The invention (mado by a Canadian, nam. ed Lefanier, of Quebee, ) is the property of Mr. Wm. Robinson, (patentec,) under the patent are made by an in orporated company, having a working capitai of 8260,000 , and manufac tory in Contt streot, Brooklyn capable of turning out 100 puits per day at present. - N.
