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Epitome of Telegraphic News.

DATES TO FEBRUARY 23.

New York, Feb. 23.—The original Republican element throughout the States appear to side with Congress on the issue between that body and the President.

The resolution which passed the House, forbidding the admission of Southern members, was taken up. Mr. Sherman opposed the consideration of the question, saying that it could not be fairly discussed at the present time. Mr. Fessenden said he called up the motion because he considered it of the greatest importance. He denied that there was any desire to get up a quarrel between the President and Congress. If Congress is placing itself in the way of reconstruction by keeping out the members from the South, it ought to know it. Mr. Sherman, in reply, thought that the events of yesterday were too fresh in the memory of Senators not to have some influence upon them, and he thought it well to allow that influence to pass away. Mr. Fessenden took up the resolution, arguing that it was the determination of Congress not to act upon the credentials of the Southern members until they had passed a law for the admission of the Southern States. Mr. Fessenden read from the President's speech a paragraph stating that the States had no right to go out of the Union, and he maintained the theory that when the States gave evidence of loyalty and obedience, they should be restored according to the tenor of former relations. Mr. Fessenden argued the right of Congress to inquire whether any of the conditions named by the President had been complied with, and said the special committee was nothing more than a servant of Congress and could not set up any authority against that body which had made it. On the subject of the bill vetoed by the President, he said he had never been a warm friend of the bill, but he yielded his objections because he thought the powers conferred by it were constitutional and their exercise necessary. He voted to sustain the bill when it was returned, because he objected to the closing portions of the veto message, expressing the opinion that Congress could not make a law to tax a State unrepresented.

Mr. Ramsay's bill was introduced in the Senate to-day to secure the construction of the Northern Pacific Railroad and telegraph line, and authorizes the Secretary of the Treasury whenever the Commissioners of the Railroad shall report the completion of two hundred and fifty or more consecutive miles, to pledge the credit of the Government to the payment of the interest on the stock at the rate of six per cent. per annum semi-annually, at the rate of \$20,000 per mile.

Senator Sherman has the floor for Monday, and will speak in favor of the House concurrent resolution affirming the views of Congress concerning the admission of the Southern members.

New York, Feb. 23.—The following are additional remarks made by Mr. Seward at the Cooper Institute last evening: Mr. Seward said Congress agonized over the question of reconstruction, not because the war has not come out right, but because they have not individually had a hand in bringing it to a happy termination. I hope no serious difficulty, from the conviction that there never was and never can be any successful process for restoring union and harmony among the States except the one with which the President has avowed, he himself is satisfied. The President is in harmony with all the States that were in the rebellion, and the Executive and Judicial Departments are resuming their functions. Loyal representatives, more or less from these States, are now standing at the door of Congress, and have been standing there for three months, asking to be admitted as States, which, against their earnest desire, are left unrepresented.

Say what you will, the States are already organized in harmony with our amended Constitution, and are in earnest co-operation with the Federal Government.

It is impossible to reduce a State to a territorial condition. Congress has had a reconstruction committee of fifteen members, who have stopped the wheels of legislation for three months to enable them to submit a plan different from that which is now on the eve of a happy consummation; and what have they given us or proposed? An amendment to the Constitution to compel the excluded States to equalize suffrage on penalty of abridgement of their representation. This was no plan of reconstruction but an obstruction. A conflict in opinion between the President and Congress in reference to the Freedmen's Bureau is in its consequences comparatively unimportant. It would excite little interest if it stood alone. Both fully agree that this Bureau was created for the transition period between war and peace and should cease at the end of that period. The President thinks that period nearly passed, and the original provision is sufficient, while Congress thinks the original provision needs enlarging.

I agree with the President in the hope that the extraordinary provision is not necessary. Ought the President be denounced in the house of his enemies? Much more ought he be denounced in the house of his friends for refusing in the absence of any necessity to occupy or retain the exercise of powers greater than those which are exercised by any imperial magistrate in the world. Judge ye, I trust, this fault of declining imperial power too rashly, tendered by a too confiding Congress, may be forgiven by a generous people.

It will be a sad hour for the republic when the refusal of unnecessary powers and patronage by the President shall be held as crime. When it shall be so considered, the time will have arrived for setting up at the White House an Imperial throne, surrounding the Executive with Imperial legions.
