Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

DATES TO MARCH 3.

New York, March 2.—The Times' Washington special dispatch says: The President is fully sustained by his Cabinet, and there will be no rupture.

Washington, March 1.—Mrs. Jane G. Swisshelm was dismissed from a clerkship in the Quartermaster General's office on Monday, for using language disrespectful to the President, in a little weekly paper edited by her.

Chicago, March 1.—The Tribune's Washington dispatch says: The principal feature of the proceedings of Congress yesterday, was the discussion of Binham's Constitutional Amendment, in the House. Mr. Davis, of New York, a moderate Republican, spoke for an hour and a half against it, taking in some respects the ground occupied by the President, viz.: That such important questions, affecting the interests of the whole nation, ought not to be legislated upon while eleven States were unrepresented. He urged the necessity of action between the Legislative and Executive branches of the Government, and announced himself an admirer of the President and his general line of policy.

Mr. Woodbridge, of Vermont, followed in a very brief speech, in favor of the proposition, and spoke with force and clearness.

Mr. Bingham, of Ohio, closed the debate answering the objection urged against the amendment, saying it was nothing more or less than a proposition to give Congress power to enforce the guarantee of the bill of rights. He deplored temporizing, and demanded that the issues of the hour be met in a manly and resolute spirit. One brave deed that would commend itself to the natural instincts of the people would be worth fifty make bids.

Chicago, March 1.—The Minnesota Legislature adopted a resolution by a strict party vote, that it is to Congress that the people look for a true reconstruction policy, and we rely upon its firmness and wisdom in the present exigency of public affairs. Resolutions sustaining the President were tabled by a party vote. Both branches of the Legislature adjourned to day.

The Wisconsin Legislature adopted the following:

Resolved, That whereas, we have witnessed with gratitude the noble and devoted patriotism manifested by President Johnson during the dark days of the rebellion, we should be guilty of deceiving him and misrepresenting our constituents if we failed to declare that the message vetoing the Freedmen's bill in its general tone and spirit, has caused pain and disappointment among his true friends and supporters, and has been hailed with exuberant joy and exultation by every man who sympathizes with the rebellion; or who was cold and indifferent when treason threatened the life of the Republic.

Resolved, That we most cordially indorse and approve the action of Senators and Representatives in Congress who have persistently asserted the right of Congress to determine for itself when and in what manner it will admit Representatives from the States disorganized by the rebellion, and earnestly requests them to firmly resist the admission of Representatives from such States until peace is fully secured, and until the people of each State have positively guaranteed equal and exact justice to all men within her borders.

Washington, March 2.—The Miscellaneous Appropriation Bill as it passed the House includes the following: For the survey of Public Lands in California, \$30,000; Oregon and Washington, \$20,000 each; Nebraska, \$20,000; Colorado, \$10,000.

New York, March 3.—The Commercial's Washington dispatch says: The English Minister has protested against immunity enjoyed by Fenians, but the Government does not regard the evidence sufficient to warrant interference.

The Post's Washington special dispatch says: The reconstruction committee has agreed to the proposition to admit the delegation from Tennessee to seats in Congress. Two or three other representatives will be presented by the members of the committee, the majority reporting against the resolution in favor of their admission. The Tennessee members will probably obtain their seats soon.

Washington, March 3.—The Senate remained in session until a late hour last night, and finally passed the House resolution not to admit the Senators and Representatives from lately rebellious States until Congress declared each State restored to the Union; yeas, 29; nays, 18. The following were the yeas: Anthony, Brown, Clark, Chandler, Conness, Cragin, Crosswell, Fezenen, Foster, Grimes, Harris, Henderson, Howe, Kirkwood, Lane, of Indiana, Lane of Kansas, Morrell, Nye, Pomeroy, Pollard, Ramsay, Sherman, Sprague, Sumner, Trumbull, Williams, Wade, Wilson and Yates.—29. Nays: Buckalew, Cowan, Davis, Doolittle, Dixon, Guthrie, Hendricks, Johnson, McDougal, Morgan, NeSmith, Morton, Riddle, Saulsbury, Stewart, Stockton, Van Winkle, Willey.—18.
