PROCEEDINGS OF CITY COUNCIL.—At a special meeting of the Common Council of Dalles City, held at the Recorder's office, on Wednesday afternoon, March 7th, 1866, at the call of the Mayor, there were present N. H. Gates, Mayor, Buchanan, Welch, Miller and Bird, Councilmen, and F. S. Holland, Recorder.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved, and signed by the Mayor.

The committee on streets and public property reported progress and asked for further time, which was granted.

The committee on finances, in the latter of certain bills and claims referred, made a report, and recommended that the claims of W. H. Farrar, Klint & Dougherty, Dr. Hunter and Ed. Roth, be rejected; and, on motion the report was adopted and said bills rejected.

The following bills were reported on by finance committee, and recommended the same to be paid. Said bills were read, and on motion, allowed, and warrants ordered to be issued for the several sums, to-wit: W. H. Newell, \$85; Relief Ho-e Company No. 1, \$37; Jackson Engine Company No. 1, \$115 79.

The following bills were presented and read, and on motion allowed: To F. Liebe, \$1 87; John A. Cook, \$30; Waldron & Co., \$5; Cumming & Grant, \$3; J. W. Miller & Co., \$12; N. R. Packard, \$15; Thomas Smith, \$8 50; Ed. Bulzer, \$2; Charles Keeler, \$125; Charles Keeler, \$10 16; M. M. Cushing, \$100; N. R. Packard, \$100; F. S. Holland, \$15 40.

The bill of White & Killy, for services as attorneys for the city; and also the application of J. H. Noyce, for his city taxes to be remitted, on grounds of being over-assessed, were on motion referred to finance committee.

On motion the City Recorder was instructed and required to give at least ten days notice, that an election will be held on the 2d day of April, 1866, (being the first Monday) in Dalles City, for the purpose of electing the following officers, to-wit: One Mayor, one Recorder, five Aldermen, one Marshal and one Treasurer.

On motion the Recorder was instructed to give notice to all persons having claims against the city, to present them on or before the 25th inst.

On motion the Recorder was directed to make out an exhibit of the receipts and expenditures of the year ending the 1st day of April, 1866.

We are able to report some progress in war matters today. Elsewhere the proceedings of the two previous meetings are published in full, as furnished us by the Secretary, F. Kenyon. Last night an adjourned meeting was held, at which time it was found that sixty-two names were enrolled, and about eighteen hundred dollars worth of money, horses, and subsistence subscribed. There will be a considerable increase to the above amount subscribed to day. It is also learned that quite a number of the farmers in the valley below, are ready and anxious to go, and furnish horses and subsistence. This is something practical. If followed up now with the energy that is at present displayed, the boys will, in a few days, be in a condition to entertain a hundred or two Indians in a lively manner. The necessity of arresting the Indians in their wild career, is apparent. Nearly all the troops in this subdistrict were ordered away last fall, and only a very limited number sent to take their places. It will be midsummer before more troops can or will be got in the field, so they will be too late for the purpose of protecting the spring immigration from California. The case requires immediate remedy. It will pay in a pecuniary way, to spend a liberal sum to drive out these savages within the next sixty days. The increased security and amount of business alone will amply repay in one season. This is the light in which our citizens look at it, and they are therefore subscribing liberally. We have not learned what is being done in Owyhee, but if we must fight Indians in order to keep our stock, and keep open communication with the rest of the world, let's have it done at once and well done.—Idaho Statesman, Feb. 24th.

WHO HE IS.—Gen. Thos. F. Sweeney, Fenian Commander-in-Chief, is a printer by trade, and shortly before the Mexican war, worked as a compositor in the book office of A. S. Gould, Nassau street. He volunteered to go to Mexico, and was handsomely fitted out for the campaign by his fellow-craftsmen. In the campaign he was disabled, and, as a reward for his bravery, received from the United States Government, a commission in the regular army, and an office of emolument, we believe, in the Brooklyn Navy Yard. During the late war he participated actively, and was promoted to the rank of Colonel, with the brevet of Brigadier General of Volunteers—a position of which he was lately deprived, for being absent without leave, on business connected with the Fenian movement. An attempt has been made by his friends to have his army grade restored, but without success.
