Miss.—I am gratified to see that you have organized a convention without difficulty, and hope that without delay the convention will amend the State convintion of the state of the state. the State constitution, abolising slavery and denying future legis atures power to make property in man. If you could ext-nd the elective franchise to all persons of color who can read the constitution and write their names, and to all persons of color who own real estate valued at not less than \$250, and arm the adversary and set an example that other States will follow. This you can do with perfect safety, and you will thus place the Southern States in reference to persons of color, upon the same basis with the free States. I hope and trust your convention will do this, and as a consequence the Redicals who are wild upon the negro franchise, will be completely foiled in their attempts to keep the Southern States from renewing their relations to the Union by not accepting their Senators and Representatives-

Chicogo, March 9 - The Pennsylvania Union convention yesterday nominated Gen. John W. Geary for Governor on the first ballot, and adopted resolutions declaring that the work of reconstruction belongs to Congress; that the national faith is pledged for the payment of the public debt and the protection of the freedmen; praising Governor Curtin and Secretary Hunter; and request-ing Senator Cowan to resign. The Pennsyling Senator Cowan to resign. The Pennsyl-vania Union platform covers eighteen reso lutions say it is our most imperative duty to gather the legitimate fruits of the war so that the constitution may be purified, our institutions strengthened and the national life prolonged; that failure in these grave duties would be scarcely less criminal than ac-quiescence in secession; that it would be an insult to every soldier who took up arms to save the country ; that filled with admiration of the patriotic devotion and fearless courage of Andrew Johnson the people of Pennsylvania express confidence in him, and with the confidence so expressed, appeal to him to stand firmly by the side and repose upon the support of the loyal masses. The fifth resolution declares that the work of restoration necessarily belongs to the law-mak-ing power, to deny which imperils the dearest rights of a representative government; as a preliminary to that work Congress should carefully investigate conditions and declare terms; that, generally, we approve the action of Congress hitherto on the subject. Toronto, March 9.—The popular rally under

the call for volunteers exceeds thirty thousand. Over two thousand arrived here last night. The people are fully aroused, and no man shirks his duty. The most exciting ru-mors prevail of Fenian intentions to invade Canada, and the Government has taken possession of the telegraph lines. Preparations have been made to send troops by tail to any point of danger at a moment's notice. Patrick's day is anticipated with intense ap-prehension, and loud calls are made on Pres-ident Johnson to interfere. The city papers this morning give two columns of special dis-patches from all parts of Canada, of the popular excitement and volunteering. Washington, March 9.-A delegation of Ken-tuckians visited the President to-day to de-liver the resolutions of the Frankfort meeting indorsing the President's veto message, saying the people of Kentucky were impatient under the presence of the Freedmen's Bureau, and having made great sacrifices during the war, now claim the right to exercise jurisdic-tion under our laws. The President returned his thanks for the expression of confidence peculiarly gratifying at this juncture, which be regarded as the most critical in the affairs of the nation. To attack and overthrow the Government by force of arms was not more dangerous to the nation than an attempt to andermine and revolutionize it by the de-struction of the safeguards thrown around

the liberties of the people in the Constitution. Our stand, said the President, has been step backward; no other or higher evidence of our purpose in this regard can be given than that a'ready furni-lied, and a hope to remedy ere long, all the irregularities to which the people have been subjected. Again do I assure you that these demonstrations of confidence and assurances of support are exceedingly cheering.
