FREIGHTS from the Dalles to Blackfoot are rating at from 35 to 45 cents per pound.

THE OFFICERS of the New York Custom House have withdrawn the rewards offered for the recovery of the body of the late Hon. Preston King.

THE HEGIRA COMMENCED.—A party of 12 or 14 persons left the Dalles yesterday morning for Blackfoot, overland.

MR. LEW DAY, the gentlemanly agent of the O. S. N. Co. at Wallula, has resigned, with the intention we believe of going to Blackfoot.

THE WEATHER.—The people of the Dalles are at present enjoying glorious weather. Clear sunshiny days, and nights just cool enough to be pleasant. In the matter of climate we are highly favored. Within the last few days the snow has almost disappeared from the hills, and everything begins to wear the appearance of spring.

MARSHAL KEELER arrested a couple of shop-lifters yesterday, and has them now lodged in the city jail, from Portland, where their depredations were committed. One of them came up on the stock boat, and the other on the Idaho. Some of the stolen goods were found in their possession; among other things, a silk dress pattern, hidden in their blankets. One of them is named Strauss; the name of the other we did not succeed in obtaining.

"LEAVING THE STATE."—Under the above caption Tuesday's Oregonian contains an article, in which a late citizen of the Dalles gets quite an extended notice with an undeserved opportunity of ventilating his opinions on Oregon matters and things in general. We are sorry that we cannot with the Oregonian regret his departure. That his estimate of the value he has been to this community, is in an inverse ratio to the fact, we need not assert. While enterprising, public spirited citizens are needed and essential to every prosperous community, we cannot class as such those men who come among us for the purpose of making a stake and then leaving without a good word in their mouths for the bridge that has carried them

OREGON STATE TREASURY.—We are under obligations to his Excellency the Governor of Oregon for a copy of an exhibit of the State Treasury from the 10th of September, 1864, to the 28th of February, 1866, inclusive of both dates. From which we learn that the balances then on hand with the receipts up to date in the State Treasury amount to \$296,280 62, of which there has been paid on warrants, \$197,141 61, leaving a balance in the Treasury on the 28th of February, 1866, of \$99,139 02, of which \$69,796 69 is General Fund, and the remainder the aggregate of the Military, Penitentiary, University, Escheat and School Funds.

There are still due the State Treasury in addition to the above, an aggregate of \$11,750 42, for taxes from Lane, Douglas and Josephine counties for the year 1865, and an aggregate of \$33,454 03 for taxes from Baker, Curry, Coos, Grant, Jackson, Josephine, Union and Umatilla counties for the year 1865, making a total of taxes still due the State of \$45,110 45.

SHERIFF SEITEL arrived here on the cars yesterday from Walla Walla, having in custody the escaped cattle thief, Jas. E. Buchanan. We extract the following particulars regarding him from the Walla Walla Statesman of the 9th inst:

Previous to coming here he had lived in Wasco county some 15 miles distant from the Dalles, where he had followed the occupation of a farmer. In the early part of 1865 he was indicted on the charge of stealing cattle, and his case came up for trial at the June term of the Circuit Court. Two indictments had been found against him. On the first of these he was tried and convicted. The second indictment had been set for trial, and the party was allowed to go at large on \$600 bail. Taking advantage of his freedom, he made his escape, and first went to California. How he finally made his way back to this country, we have no means of knowing. Certainly he was very foolish to settle down within a mile or two of the Oregon line. For several months the Oregon authorities have been cognizant of his whereabouts. A week or two since, Sheriff White was up here looking after him, but the prisoner kept out of the way. On Wednesday last he came to town for the purpose of trading, when he was captured without difficulty. As already stated, he has a wife and children who keenly feel the husband and father's disgrace.

WE learn from Mr. Merritt Kelly of South Boise that times were never so flourishing, and prospects so flattering as at the present time. By a letter received by him, dated the 20th ult., we learn that the Wide West, in ten days' run cleaned up ten thousand dollars. Ada Elmore, in ten days' run, cleaned up \$20,000. From the Idaho the amount not specified, but states that it is paying better than at any previous time, as is also the case with the Confederate Star.—Idaho World.

The weather at Helena, is warm, and the rapid melting of the snow causes quite a stream of water to run through the streets, which so flooded the business houses that it required the utmost exertions of the inhabitants to prevent damage to buildings and goods.—Montana Rattator.
