THE WEATHER .- The people of the Dalles are at present enjoying glorious weather. Clear sunshiny days, and nights just cool enough to be pleasant. In the matter of climate we are highly favored. Within the last few days the snow has almost disappeared from the hills, and everything begins to wear the appearance of spring.

MARSHAL KEELER arrested a couple of shop-lifters yesterday, and has them now lodged in the city jail, from Portland, where their depredations were committed. One of them came up on the stock boat, and the other on the Idaho. Some of the stolen goods were found in their possession ; among other things, a silk dress pattern, hidden in their blankets. OREGON STATE TREASURY .--- We are under obligations to his Excellency the Governor of Oregon for a copy of an exhibit of the State Treasury from the 10th of September, 1864, to the 28th of February, 1866, inclusive of both dates. From which we learn that the balances then on hand with the receipts up to date in the State Treasury amount to \$296,280 62, of which there has been paid on warrants, \$197,141 61, leaving a balance in the Treasury on the 28th of February, 1856, of \$99,139 02, of which \$69,-796 69 is General Fund, and the remainder the aggregate of the Military, Penitentiary, University, Escheat and School Funds.

There are still due the State Treasury in addition to the above, an aggregate of \$11,756 42, for taxes from Lane, Douglas and Josephine counties for the year 1863, and an aggregate of \$33,454 03 for taxes from Baker, Curry, Coos, Grant, Jackson, Josephine, Union and Umatilla counties for the year 1865, making a total of taxes still due the State of \$45,110 45.

SHERIFF SEITEL arrived here on the cars yesterday from Walla Walla, having in custody the escaped cattles thief, Jas. E. Buchanan. We extract the fellowing particulars regarding him from the Walla Walla Statesman of the 9th inst:

Previous to coming here he had lived in Wasco county some 15 miles distant from the Dalles, where he had followed the occupation of a farmer. In the early part of 1865 he was in-dicted on the charge of stealing cattle. and his case came up for trial at the June term of the Circuit Conrt. Two indictments had been found against him. On the first of these he was tried and convicted. The second indietment had been set for trial, and the party was allowed to go at large on \$600 bail. Taking advantage of his freedom, he made his escape, and first went to California. How he finally made his way back to this country, we have no means of knowing. Certainly he was very foolish to settle down within a mile or : wo of the Oregon line. For several months the Orogon authorities have been cognisant of his whereabouts. A week or two since, Sheriff White was up here looking after him, but the prisoner kept out of the way. On Wednesday last he came to town for the purpose of trading, when he was captured without difficulty. As already stated, he has a wife and children who keenly feel the husband and father's disgrace.


