Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

DATES TO MARCH 14.

New York, March 15.—The New York Tribune says: Efforts are being made by Henry J. Raymond, Elias D. Campbell, and others, to organize a political party in support of the President, and Raymond, being Chairman of the National Republican Executive Committee, an attempt will be made to control the machinery of that organization.

Washington, March 15.—The Postoffice Department has closed the mail lettings for the Pacific States. The competition was great, and the prices were reduced from last year. The following are the more prominent contracts: San Francisco to Sacramento, \$18,000—reduction \$2,000; San Francisco to Stockton, \$16,000—reduction \$3,000; San Juan to Los Angeles, \$18,000—reduction \$6,000. The great route from Lincoln to Portland, Oregon (624 miles) was let to Henry W. Corbett, at \$179,000—present payment \$225,000.

St. Louis, March 15.—The upper river trade with Montana and Idaho opens briskly. The chief feature of the spring business is, that the advertisements of boats fill two columns of the daily papers, and immense quantities of goods are being purchased for shipment. Several boats have already left, and not less than seventy-five boats are now receiving freight and passengers. The emigration thitherward resembles that of the California fever of 1842. All the boats loading draw three feet of water, and hope to get through before low water.

New York, March 15.—The steamer San Jacinto, of the Savannah line, was burned at the dock this morning with 500 bales of cotton and 200 barrels of flour.

Havana advices of March 16th, say that a Spanish war steamer had brought in a captured slave schooner, which was reported to have 1,574 slaves on board.

The Indiana Democratic State Convention met on the 14th inst., at Indianapolis, and after nominating a State ticket, adopted resolutions endorsing the President's veto.

UNION COUNTY CONVENTION.—The Wasco County Union Convention met at the Court House, in this city, yesterday, nearly all the precincts in the county were fully represented, and quite an interest was manifested in the proceedings. Hon. J. G. Wilson was elected chairman, and O. N. Denny, was chosen secretary.

The following named gentlemen were elected delegates to the State Convention: H. A. Hogue, C. B. Kogge, C. Coe, M. Kuntz, J. B. Condon, R. Mays, J. Halloran, O. N. Denny, C. R. Moigs, Z. Donnell and J. G. Wilson.

No other business was transacted, and the Convention adjourned to meet again on the 5th day of May next, when the nominations for County officers will be made.

A CHANGE.—The steamer Idaho arrived at an early hour yesterday afternoon, bringing about forty passengers and a good freight. The fine steamer Oneonta will take the place of the Idaho on the line on Monday morning, the latter being hauled off for repairs. The Oneonta was built in 1863, since which time she has done considerable service. She is 158 feet in length; breadth of beam, 28 feet; depth of hold 8 feet. She has three fire free boilers and has two eighteen inch cylinders with six feet stroke. Her carrying capacity is about 500 tons, and she has ample room for three hundred passengers. She has been thoroughly overhauled this winter, and is now one of the finest boats on the Columbia river.

NEW PAPERS.—We are in receipt of two new papers: The Eugene City News and the Oregon Herald; the former, as its name indicates, published at Eugene City, by J. B. Alexander, is only intended as a campaign paper, and is rabid enough in its political sentiment to please Jeff. Davis himself. The latter is published at Portland, by Messrs. Abbott & Butler, and intends to live as long as it can. Though like the former, democratic in politics, it is much more respectable in tone and appearance.

The Dalles Social Club propose holding a soiree next Wednesday evening, which is, we understand, to be a very select affair. A limited number of tickets will be issued.
