A PART of the expedition that went from Owyhee after the Indians, returned to Ruby City on the 4th inst., and they were all expected to return soon. They have learned, after try ing it, what everybody knew before, that nothing can be accomplished in fighting Indians unless the men are well mounted.

J. H. D. HENDERSON, our member in Congress, announces bimself in the State Journal as a candidate for renomination. The people of this section have had enough of Mr. Hendersen, and propose to substitute a man from this side of the mountains who will be more competent to represent their interests. Mr. H. has been to Congress once too often.

CITY ELECTION .- Next Monday week is our city election. We'do not apprehend that it will be made a party test, nor do we think that the best ends would be subserved by making it one; still we are of the opinion that some of the present officers have, by their attendance to their duties, de served a re-election, and shall consider it much to be regretted if they are scriously opposed simply on account of their political opinions.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION .- The Democratic County Convention met yes terday at the Court House, in this city, and elected the following gentlemen delegates to the Democratic State Convention : Col. N. H. Gates, J. Teal, M. J. Allphin, J. Fulton, C. Goldbaum, W. P. Miller, F. S. Holland, J. Williams, and J. H. Blakney. The delegates were instructed to vote for Col. N. H. Gates for the nomination for Congress. The convention adjourned to meet on the 7th day of May, when the nominations for county officers vill be made.

INDIAN ATROCITIES IN IDAHO .- We gather from the Idaho Statesman, the following Indian items:

Six or eight head of cattle were run off from near Camp Reed, seventeen miles beyond Rock Creek station on the Overland Stage line, on the 28d of February. About the same time eight head of horses were stolen from Briggs & Clark's Ferry on Snake River. The camp of Russels & Majors, which is about 60 miles from Boise City, lost 27 head of cattle. These latter were driven to Snake River, but the Indians failing to get them across, they killed six, and the remainder were recovered by the owners.

A letter from Ruby city, dated the 5th inst., says:

More sad news was brought up from Jordon Valley this afternoon. Last Friday evening about dusk, the Indians chased Mr. Osborn-horse and all-into Dr. Inskip's house and kept up a furious attack on the premises all night, completely riddling the board part with balls-fortunately not hurt ing any one. During the night they killed a borse within sight of the bouse, built a fire, cooked and eat him up. Mr. Osborn got out the back side of the house and went to the camp for help. Thirty soldiers were sent out, but unfortunately they lost their way and did not succeed in intercepting the savages, who continued their firing on the house until after daylight, and until about eight o'clock, when they left down the road towards the Owyhee. Some hours afterwards parties passing down the road found the bodies of two men, Messrs. Lockwood, and Brown, who had been murdered by the savages, and one of them hor ribly mutilated—being scalped and his heart cut out and stuck on a stake. Mr. Lockwood was well known here and universally respected, and this brutal outrage causes intense feeling hereabouts. I cannot get full particulars, but this is the substance of this lamentable affair.

The miners of Boise County are beginning to open their claims for working, and the ditches are being cleaned and repaired for the Spring work. The Blackfoot fever a pears to be subsiding, the general news from there not being very favorable, and quite a number of Boiseites are expected to return as soon as the Spring opens.

More of "Lo."-A letter written from Warm Spring Reservation, under date of March 12th, gives a few more items of "Lo" friendly visits to the cattle-herders in that neighborhood We are permitted to publish the following extracts:

Mr. Scott, of the cattle-ranch, from across the river [Des Chutes] has just arrived, accompanied by a Mr. Sherwood, who is on the track of the horses stolen from the Canyon City road. He has tracked them to the head of Willow Creek, and they are gone on to the head-waters of Crooked River.

Three nights ago, fifteen Snake Indians went into the camp of Evans & Hardisty, and drove off about six head of horses belonging to Messrs. Scott & Ritchie, and took everything they could find in eamp. They drove the borsesoff to the head of Willow Creek. Mr. Scott and party followed them the day after, and found that the horses were driven in the same direction as those stolen from the Canyon City road, but concluded that there was no use in continuing the pursuit as the
