Washington, March 22. - The President transmitted to the House to-day over 11,000 pages of manuscript—correspondence on the resources and condition of Mex co. It dates back from this month two or three years .--Most of it has been published.

During the day's proceedings in the House Raymond of New York, asked Bingham of Ohio, what had become of the resolution for the admission of Tennessee, and if it would be brought up again for reconsideration.— Bingham of Ohio, replied that the gentleman was mistaken as to the nature of the proposition. Chicago, March 23.—An item was telegraphed which says that Treasurer Spinner had published a letter maintaining the correctness of Controller Clark's statement. The fact is precisely the reverse. Treasurer Spinner's letter explains that the books in Spinner's letter explains that the books in his office are the only authority on the treasury finances, and that the Convoller does not and cannot know from his own books the exact current condition of accounts with national banks. He says the deposits in national banks are returned weekly as certificates and reports are received balancing as cash in the treasury. The discrepancy between the bank report and the treasury statement arises from the fact that the banks are charged weekly with the amounts deposited with them by revenue officers and others and are corrected daily with checks drawn on them; hence it occurs that the amount due the department, and the books of the banks will differ materially from the balances; according to the books of the de-partment. For instance, the treasury may draw to day on different deposits. The banks of course should be accredited with the amount of checks drawn upon them while they cannot charge the Government until the checks are presented, which may not happen for days or weeks after.
