USELESS GRUMBLING.—Our exchanges are full of complaints about the mismanagement of the mails.—We wonder when folks will get sense enough to cease their grumbling about such trifles as the mails and Indian difficulties!

CAPTAIN BORLAND's company of the 1st Oregon Infantry, which started down last winter and was obliged by the severity of the weather to go into quarters at Auburn, has again taken up the line of march, and may be expected at the Dalles in a few days.—The number of men seriously injured is not as great as was at first reported. The worst and most pitiable case is that of one of the men who had to have both feet amputated. This company, it will be recollected, was raised in Wasco and Grant Counties.

THE *Idaho World* of the 17th says that Capt. Walker, commandant at Fort Boise, will at an early day move all the forces and supplies which he can spare to Reynolds creek, where it is intended to make a depot, from which to operate against the Indians.

Capt. White of the 1st Oregon Cavalry has taken the field already with a very respectable force, and Captain Walker expects ere soon to join him. The Ada County volunteers are out on their own hook, and it is hoped they will succeed in catching some of the redskins.

WHITE BLUFFS.—We are permitted to take the following extract from a letter from James A. Odell, Esq., dated Spokane Ferry, March 21st, 1866. Mr. Odell was enroute from White Bluffs to Lake Pen d'Oreille, viewing out a wagon road, and writes as follows:

"So far I have found an excellent wagon road. There is not over five miles of sandy road on the whole route, and no hills to amount to anything. I am much better satisfied with the location of White Bluffs than I was before I came out over the country. I think there is very little doubt of the success of the Bluffs."

MONTANA AND NEW GRENADA.—From a new journal just started in San Francisco, called the *Miner*, devoted entirely to the mining interests of the Pacific coast, we cut the following rather interesting account of the different mines now attracting public attention:

From all parts of the compass we hear of new, and in many cases, important mineral discoveries on this coast. The most important of which are within the new Territory of Montana, in what is known as the Blackfoot country. There is but little doubt that a tract of country embracing the mountainous regions extending from the Missouri to British Columbia, is exceedingly rich in placer diggings and in veins of metallic ores.—Nearly seven hundred miles of this vast mineral store-house has been "prospected," and is known to be rich. The present centre of attraction is near the new city of Helena, near the very summit of the Rocky Mountains, and within a few miles of the Missouri river. We have not been able to prepare for publication the materials at our disposal at this time, but in our next issue we shall give a full account of that region. At present we can only state that the principal placer mines now being worked are on the west side of the summit of the Rocky Mountains, the snows on the east side being too deep to admit of mining operations at this season. The whole region is composed of granite, slate and volcanic rocks, and their debris, precisely such as characterize the mining districts of this State and Australia. The gold obtained from the placers is remarkably pure, being worth from \$17 to \$19 per ounce. Many extensive quartz veins have been discovered, containing free gold. Copper, silver and lead ore have also been discovered in considerable abundance, there is not a shadow of a doubt that this new Territory will attract an enormous emigration during the coming spring and summer, not only from this State, but from the eastern States and Europe. We will dispatch an Agent there as soon as possible, to furnish the Association with reliable information. The best route by which to reach the Blackfoot country is via Portland, Oregon, and the Mullan road to the Rocky Mountains. The cost need not exceed \$200, if economy is an object to those who intend to go there.

With reference to the stories of rich mines in New Grenada and other localities in Central America, they are as much of a humbug as were similar stories, which prevailed in '52 and '53, relating to the Amazon river mines. We were among about 3,000 persons who went to that "rush," of whom more than one half lie buried in the arid soil of Peru—who perished like dogs, through exposure in an inhospitable, pestilential climate.

It has been suggested to us, not by any person but in a more impressive manner, that our City Fathers ought to give us a dog law. Our town is full of worthless curs, which make night hideous, and which no argument can induce us to believe are of any value to anybody. The owner of a good dog is willing to pay a small tax on him, but the dogs we speak of would soon have their rations stopped, if taxed. In the wickedness of our hearts we have often wished they would take the disease of which Artemus Ward's dogs died of. "It was," says Ward, "a peculiar throat disease. It wan't the brown creeters, nor the diptherious, but a kind of opening from ear to ear."

PASSENGERS who came up on the *Sierra Nevada* are of opinion that a greater number of miners than heretofore chronicled will arrive by the *Pacific* and *Montana*, on their next trips.

GRAPES.—Quite a number of our citizens who have little garden spots are putting out grape cuttings this year. As this delicious fruit does well in this locality with very little care and attention, we are surprised that so few are grown. They sell readily and would no doubt well repay some one to engage in their culture extensively.
